


COURSE DESCRIPTION

Art 222 Sculpture: Material and Fabrication is a beginning level art course designed to explore some of the various materials and techniques used to create contemporary sculpture. The course is designed to give students the technical skills associated with traditional object making such as clay building, woodworking and metal fabrication, provide them with a knowledge of historic and modern sculptors and create an environment for them to experiment with and apply ideas important to contemporary art.

Students are expected to gain not only technical ability and knowledge related to sculpture, but to also explore there own relationship to art making. This is to be accomplished through lectures, field trips, writing assignments, critiques, discussion, and the making of art.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students will...

Apply advanced understanding of 3D design techniques and basic knowledge of wood and metal working with the ability to apply these principles to achieve specific results

Acquire knowledge of the history and theory of sculpture, including contemporary trends and major sculptors, processes and materials

Discuss and critique their own work as well as the work of their classmates effectively and make changes based on those discussions

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

THREE STUDIO PROJECTS

Student will be required to comp lete three sculpture related projects this semester. Each of these projects will deal with a different approach to creating contemporary art. Time will be given to explore materials, techniques, themes, create "experiments" and develop ideas.

Students may be expected to create drawings, "mock ups" and discuss proposals before work on final pieces may begin. In addition to representing your best artistic efforts, projects must be complete and exhibition ready by the date of your assigned critique in order to receive full points.

Written artist statements will be required as well as critique notes for one of your fellow classmates. The details of these will be explained in class.

CRITIQUES

Critiques offer the opportunity for a dialogue of constructive criticism that helps the artist/designer to find the strengths and weaknesses of her work. Each student is expected to contribute to this discussion. In fact your participation grade is based in part on your willingness to join in during the critique.

If you are absent from a critique your project is considered late, and the highest grade you can receive for that project is a "B". There is no way of making up the points lost for missing a critique.

REQUIRED MATERIALS



HOMEWORK

Each student will be expected to come to class prepared to work for that class period. This may mean conducting research or obtaining materials off campus and making sure that you have them with you at the beginning of the class period. Any preparation that you must do to be prepared to work in class is considered homework and will be evaluated as such.

GALLERY REPORT

There will be one gallery report required this semester. This paper must be 2-3 pages in length, 12pt font, and double spaced. Its contents should include information about an artist, sculpture, or exhibition that interests you as well as your personal thoughts in response to the exhibition. You must attend the exhibition in order to do this. Please include images if you can.



CELL PHONES

Turn off all ringers. Do not take/make calls or text in class. If you have an emergency or special circumstance, please explain it to me in advance. No ear-buds or headphones. When you are in class, work to be sure that your full attention is here as well. This is a safety issue as much as a being present in the moment issue. You may use a laptop or phone in class if you are engaged in research that is specifically related to the course related task at hand.

The following will be enforced for each infraction

1st offence - warning 2nd offence- tardy 3 or more - an absence for each offence

CLEAN UP

Art, by its nature is a messy process. It is important that you clean up after yourself. This includes the classroom and anywhere else that you might work. These are areas that we all share and use, so be courteous and leave your work area as clean as or cleaner then you found it. If you habitually neglect to clean up after yourself your final grade can be lowered by a full letter grade.

SAFETY AND OPEN SHOP

This semester the students will be instructed in the safe and proper use of several power tools and use of the departments facilities. Some of these tools and equipment have an inherent element of danger related to their use. Failure to follow proper instruction or to use proper safety equipment will result in the lowering of your grade, a ban from using our facilities, not to mention possible injury.

If you do not feel comfortable using any equipment, it is not required for the course.

Open shop will take place on Tuesday evening and Friday afternoon. This is an excellent opportunity to continue working on your projects, get additional feedback from the instructor, or get more comfortable with the facilities.

STORAGE

When possible, the art dept tries to provide students with storage areas for larger materials and works in progress. For smaller items you can claim a locker by putting a Master Lock on an empty locker and registering the combination with Allyson in the art dept. office. Be sure to mark all materials that belong to you.

While the grading of art is necessarily subjective, I try to approach each student's work as fairly and objectively as possible, taking in to account each of the student's circumstances & abilities. Individual work will be graded on the following components

- Meets Project Objectives
- Effort
- Composition
- Craftsmanship/Technical
- Concept/Creativity

A more specific breakdown of how individual projects are to be evaluated will be provided in a handout upon the introduction of each project.

Assignments turned in late will receive an automatic one letter grade deduction. For each additional day the assignment is late an additional letter grade will be deducted
