Syllabus

Course Description

Art 345 focuses on advanced procedures applied to drawing the human figure with an emphasis on contemporary and traditional styles, techniques in a variety of media, human anatomy, and historical influences. Students are expected to explore and refine various methods for representing the human form from both a conceptual and technical perspective.

Course Learning Outcomes

Students who are successful in this course will:

- Draw the human figure in two-dimensional images that represent, or look like three-dimensional reality using traditional and non-traditional media.
- Demonstrate how observation-based drawings using a variety of purposes, approaches, and materials can transpose the human figure from the third- dimension into unique two-dimensional compositions.
- 3. Create human figure-based drawings in expressionistic and abstract styles.
- Critique their own and classmates drawings based on general concepts of design, composition, and problem solving.

Course Format

- Major projects are completed primarily outside of class and are graded individually as they are completed.
- Studio Practice In class drawings are graded only at one of the two portfolio submission dates.

Major Projects

Will vary in complexity and scope and may range from 1-3 weeks in working time. Major projects should showcase both conceptual and technical development. These will be graded as they are completed throughout the semester.

Portfolios

Portfolios will be collected 2 times during the semester The contents of each portfolio will be discussed prior to its due date. Portfolios will be graded considering technical expertise and process based criteria, concept/content.

Critiques

There will be an in class critique on the due date for each of the major projects. These critiques offer students an opportunity for constructive criticism which helps the artist to find the strengths and weaknesses of their work. Each student is expected to contribute to this discussion. Your participation grade is based in part on your willingness to share your understanding of the relevant topics during critique. If you are absent from a critique your project is considered late, and the highest grade you can receive for that project is a "D". There is no way of making up the points lost for missing a critique.

Clean Up

Art, by its nature is a messy process. It is important that you clean up after yourself. This includes the classroom and anywhere else that you might work. These are areas that we

all share and use, so be courteous and leave your work area as clean as or cleaner then you found it. If you habitually neglect to clean up after yourself your final grade can be lowered by a full letter grade.

Attendance

In class we will discuss your work on an ongoing basis; this course is intended to be an <u>experience</u> for students. While myself and your classmates may help you understand information that may have been missed due to absence, this will leave you with a lesser command of the subject matter.

Per PLNU policy, your attendance is required at every class session. If you are absent it is your responsibility to find out, and make up, whatever you have missed. The following attendance policy will be strictly enforced.

1-3 absences--no effect

4-5 absences--1/2 grade deduction each

Being more than a few minutes late -- Tardy

Grading Methods

Individual work will be graded on the following criteria

- * Effort
- * Craftsmanship/Technical
- * Concept/Creativity

A specific breakdown of how individual projects are to be evaluated will be provided in a handout upon the introduction of each project. Individual projects will receive a formal evaluation upon completion. Students will then have the opportunity to make suggested (or necessary) changes before they turn them in with the portfolio for a letter grade. Assignments turned in late will receive an automatic one letter grade deduction. For each additional day the assignment is late an additional letter grade will be deducted.

Final Grade

Grades will be based on a total number of points accumulated during the semester, with a possible total of 650 points.
