COURSE DESCRIPTION

Art 221 examines photography as a fine art form and as a tool for communication and personal expression. An exploration of photographic history, theory and applied laboratory experience will be conducted in order to facilitate the student's growth as an artist become prepared for advanced course work. This will be accomplished through the following goals.

- Provide basic information regarding camera, film, processing and printing.
- Provide a historical context for contemporary photography.
- Introduce students to the vocabulary of photography.
- Incorporate composition, lighting, and special effects aspart of the photographic process.
- Introduce assignments which will develop in the student skills of picture taking as will as skills of printing.

Students will be expected to achieve these goals through in class assignments, lab experience, demostraitions, lectures, and critiques. It is essenntial that you spend time working in assignments both inside and outside of class.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Acquire technical skills such as the manual operation of camera, the ability to determine correct exposure settings, the ability to process exposed black and white film into negatives, and the ability to operate an enlarger and create photographic prints.
- Identify basic rules of picture composition and evaluate photographs in terms of their technical control and visual content.
- Articulate their motivations, conceptual intent, and feelings about the work they present in critique as well as offer constructive criticism to their classmate about the work they present at critique.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Weekly Images & Contact Sheet

Each week the students will be presented with a new photo assignment. These assignments are intended to advance the students technical and conceptual abilities. Each week you will be responsible for shooting at least one roll of film based on the assignment and turning in a contact sheet for that role.

Written Work

There will be two types of written assigments due this semester.

- 1.Gallery Report. You are required to attend and review an art exhibit during the semester. The review should be one to two pages in length, typed (12 pt font only) and double-spaced. It should be a critical analysis of the work based on the principals learned in class.
- 2. In preparation for each critique you will be required to generate an artists stament that includes artistic influences, introspection and rationell for the work. You will also be required to creatre a similar write up on another students work.

Critiques

There will be two formal class critiques during the semester. These critiques offer the opportunity for a dialogue of constructive criticism that helps the artist to find the strengths and weaknesses in their work. Each student is expected to contribute to the discussion during the critique. There is no way of making up the points lost for being absent on the day of a critique.

ATTENDANCE

Per PLNU policy, your attendance is required at every class session. If you are absent it is your responsibility to find out, and make up, whatever you have missed. The following attendance policy will be strictly enforced.

CLEAN UP

Art, by its nature is a messy process. It is important that you clean up after yourself. This includes the classroom and anywhere else that you might work. These are areas that we all share and use, so be courteous and leave your work area as clean as or cleaner then you found it. Each Student will be required to keep thier personal work area clean as well as the sharred work areas. If you habitually neglect to clean up after yourself your final grade can be lowered by a full letter grade.

GRADING POLICY

While the grading of art is necessarily subjective, I try to approach each student's work as fairly and objectively as possible, taking in to account each of the student's circumstances & abilities. Individual work will be graded on the following components

- · Meets Project Requirements
- · Composition/Visual
- · Craftsmanship/Technical
- · Concept/Creativity
- · Effort

Individual projects will receive a formal evaluation upon completion. Students will then have the opportunity to make suggested (or necessary) changes before they turn them in with the portfolio for a letter grade.

Assignments turned in late will receive an automatic Letter Grade deduction. You will then have one week from the due date to turn it in. After one week you will receive an "F" for that project, even if there is no scheduled class on that day. On time means the beginning of class ready to critique.
