Discussion Boards

Each week students will participate in online discussions with classmates, which are related to the week's readings. These discussions replace the interactive dialogue that occurs in the traditional classroom setting. **Discussions represent 20 % of the overall course grade.**

Relective Written Exercises in Section 1

Reflective written exercises are during the first online portion of this course. These journal entries will provide an opportunity for students to engage in spiritual disciplines for personal growth and to learn how to teach these exercises to others in the future. These Reflective exercise are 10% of the overall course grade.

Triad Response Forum in Section 1 and 3

Each student has been placed in a "Triad", a randomly selected small group. These groups will read each other's Reflection Exercises and respond in Section 1, will meet together during the on campus week, and will give weekly feedback to each other on the Project Assignments due each week in the last online portion of the course. These Triad Response Forums constitute 20% of the overall grade.

Projects Assignments in Section 3

Each week in the final online portion of the course, students will be completing specific assignments from Planning For Christian Education Formation. These will be shared with Triad groups where ongoing feedback will be given. These assignments are building blocks for the final paper. Project Assignments represent 10% of the overall course grade.

Final Project

Prepare your final Christian Formation Plan with the following content;

- 1. Theology of Christian Formation
- 2. Context for Ministry (include general demographics and a description of your location)
- 3. Christian Education Leadership Team description
- 4. Your 4 week Advent Plan
- 5. Summary of Learning

This plan should draw from coursework, include citations from our reading, and incorporate ideas and feedback given from the professor and your triad throughout the semester. You plan should be 15-20 pages in length, double-spaced. Plan is due by Monday June 22. Please submit it in Canvas.

(The Final Project represents 10% of the overall course grade.)

ATTENDANCE

Regular and punctual attendance is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. As a student in this course, you will have a minimum attendance requirement of three days each week. This means you will need to log into Canvas and post an assignment or response on at least three days in each week. Any day missed below this minimum requirement will count as an absence. Students may be dropped from the course if two such absences are recorded during the class and **will be** dropped if four such absences occur or if a student fails to attend class in any given week.

INCOMPLETE AND LATE ASSIGNMENTS

All assignments are to be submitted by the due dates posted. There will be a 5% reduction of possible points for each day an assignment is late. If missing assignments result in the your failure to meet learning outcomes, this instructor may give up to a letter grade reduction on the final grade in addition to the loss of points for missing work. No assignments will be accepted after midnight on Sunday night, the last day of class.

While there are due dates for weekly assignments, you are welcome to post your work earlier in the week. In our discussions, late work means that others may not have the opportunity to respond to your comments. It also means that you will not have the benefit of as much interaction with other students as you will have if your assignment is posted on time. If you know you will be away on the day your assignment is due, please post your work before you leave.

Assignments will be considered late if posted after midnight Pacific Standard Time on the day they are due.
