Text: A First Course in Abstract Algebra (7th Edition) by Fraleigh

Content:

This course is a study of groups, rings, fields and related structures. We will be studying all of these looking at both theory and applications.

Learning Outcomes:

- Students will be able to write proofs.
- Students will be able to demonstrate facility with algebraic structures.
- Students will be able to speak about their work with precision, clarity and organization.
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- Students will collaborate effectively in teams.
- Students will be able to understand and create arguments supported by quantitative evidence, and they can clearly communicate those arguments in a variety of formats.

Course Philosophy:

Mathematics requires active participation. Participation means: asking questions, making conjectures and checking them, providing solutions to problems, sharing ideas with classmates. We will be spending time in class working on proofs together.

Homework:

Homework will be assigned each day at the end of class. All homework assigned in a week will be **due in class** the next Wednesday. No late homework will be accepted except by prior arrangement or with a documented emergency. Homework assignments are posted on the bulletin board by my office door. The object of the homework is to learn how to do the problems so I expect to see calculations on your homework using the terminology and methods of the class and not just the answer. A random selection (the same for all people) of the problems will be graded on any homework assignment.

Exams:

There are three in-class exams. If you do not take an exam you will receive a zero for it. Late exams may be taken only by <u>prior arrangement</u> or with a documented emergency. I must participate in the decision for you to miss an exam, this means that you need to phone me <u>before</u> missing an exam.

Final:

The final is cumulative and is given on **WEDNESDAY DECEMBER 17**, **7:30 -10:00 A.M**. The final exam date and time is set by the university at the beginning of the semester and may not be changed by the instructor. Only in the case that a student is required to take three exams during the same day of finals week is an instructor authorized to change the exam date and time for that particular student.

Attendance:

Attendance is expected at each class session. In the event of an absence you are responsible for the material covered in class and the assignments given that day.

Regular and punctual attendance at all classes in which a student is registered is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. Therefore, regular attendance and participation in each course are minimal requirements to be met. There are no allowed or excused absences except as approved in writing by the Provost for specific students participating in certain university-sanctioned activities. Excused absences still count toward the 10%-20% limits, but allow students to make up work, quizzes, or tests missed as a result of a university-sanctioned activity. Activities of a unique nature, such as labs or other activities identified clearly on the syllabus, cannot be made up except in rare instances when instructors have given advanced, written approval for doing so. Whenever the number of accumulated absences in a class, for any cause, exceeds ten (10) percent of the total number of class meetings, the faculty member should send an e-mail to the student and the Vice Provost for Academic Administration (VPAA) warning of attendance jeopardy. If more than twenty (20) percent of the total number of class meetings is reported as missed, the faculty member or VPAA may initiate the student's deenrollment from the course without further advanced notice to the student. If the date of deenrollment is past the last date to withdraw from a class, the student will be assigned a grade of W or WF consistent with university policy in the Grading section of the catalog.
