1. Reflective Questions Each topic assignment is worth a total 10 possible points; completing all topic assignments successfully will provide you with a total of 30 possible points at the end of the semester. Each answer should be close to one page long and references cited.

September 17 – Question 1

Goals of a college education are numerous and varied; identify your college education goals with three arenas: 1) personal, 2) social and 3) professional/career. (10 points)

September 24 – Question 2

Describe a mentor in your life and that person's impact on you. (10 points)

October 8 – Question 3

What does integration of faith and vocation mean to you? (10 points)

- 2. Speaker/Panel Reflections Each speaker reflection is worth 20 possible points; the reflection is due the week following the speaker. Completing the speaker reflections will provide you with 20 possible points at the end of the semester.
- 3. Midterm Paper 3-4 page paper to explore three careers in the field of Family Sciences including an interview of an individual in one of the fields. A total of 80 points will be possible. 10 points for group presentation of career.
- 4. Final Paper 4-5 page paper of personal self-assessment analysis and integration of faith in your vocation. A total of 80 points will be possible. 10 points for group presentation.
- 5. In Class Participation Group points will be given for students in attendance at the discretion of the professor. 40 points possible for in class participation.

The DRC's policies and procedures for assisting such students in the development of an appropriate academic adjustment plan (AP) allows PLNU to comply with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act and the Americans with Disabilities Act. Section 504 (a) prohibits discrimination against students with special needs and guarantees all qualified students equal access to and benefits of PLNU programs and activities. After the student files the required documentation, the DRC, in conjunction with the student, will develop an AP to meet that student's specific learning needs. The DRC will thereafter email the student's AP to all faculty who teach courses in which the student is enrolled each semester. The AP must be implemented in all such courses.

If students do not wish to avail themselves of some or all of the elements of their AP in a particular course, it is the responsibility of those students to notify their professor in that course. PLNU highly recommends that DRC students speak with their professors during the first two weeks of each semester about the applicability of their AP in that particular course and/or if they do not desire to take advantage of some or all of the elements of their AP in that course.

PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY



Regular and punctual attendance at all classes is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent from more than 10 percent of class meetings, the faculty member can file a written report which may result in de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive the appropriate grade for their work and participation.
