PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance at all classes is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent from more than 10 percent of class meetings, the faculty member can file a written report which may result in de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive the appropriate grade for their work and participation. Attendance Policy for Fully Online Courses

Students taking online courses are expected to attend each week of the course. Attendance is defined as participating in an academic activity within the online classroom which includes posting in a graded activity in the course. (Note: Logging

into the course does not qualify as participation and will not be counted as meeting the attendance requirement.)

Students who do not attend at least once in any 3 consecutive days will be issued an attendance warning. Students who do not attend at least once in any 7 consecutive days will be dropped from the course retroactive to the last date of recorded attendance.

Students who anticipate being absent for an entire week of a course should contact the instructor in advance for approval and make arrangements to complete the required coursework and/or alternative assignments assigned at the discretion of the instructor. Acceptance of late work is at the discretion of the instructor and does not waive attendance requirements.

Discussion Policy

Class participation and professionalism are expected in this course. It is your responsibility to access Canvas regularly and to participate in class discussions, as your interaction with the course content, the instructor, your colleagues, and the learning process directly influences your levels of success in the course.

To reinforce and expand upon the material covered, each week you will be expected to craft **one (1)** detailed post in response to the discussion board question(s) provided. **Each original discussion board post must be at least 300 words in length, include at least one citation (in APA format), and is due by Friday at 11:59pm.**

Following your original post, you will then be asked to craft at least **one (1)** post in response to the work of your colleagues to demonstrate your understanding and application of the concepts presented, as well as to further the class discussion in a meaningful way. **Your response posts must be at least 200 words in length and must be crafted in a way to offer an additional perspective, a new point of view and/or some other type of substantive information to further the discussion and the learning process. Response posts are due by Sunday at 11:59pm.**

Please note that late submissions will not be considered for credit.

ACADEMIC STANDING

Graduate students at Point Loma must obtain a 3.0 GPA to remain in good standing in the MS Kinesiology program:

Additionally, all graduate students need to earn a C or higher in all graduate courses according to the catalog grading policy:

Traditional letter grades (A, B, C, D, F) including plus and minus grades are used to indicate the level of scholarship earned for each course. Except for the correction of an error, all traditional letter grades are final at the conclusion of the academic term. Once the degree has been posted on the student's official transcript, no change of grade action is allowed for courses leading to the degree. The grade of C is the lowest grade acceptable for graduate credit.

Late Assignments

All assignments are to be submitted by the due date and time listed in the calendar via [Canvas](#). While there are due dates for weekly assignments, you are welcome to post your work earlier in the week. In our discussions, late work means that others may not have the opportunity to respond to your comments. It also means that you will not have the benefit of as much interaction with other students as you will have if your assignment is posted on time. If you know you will be away on the day your assignment is due, please post your work before you leave. Missed exams or quizzes may ONLY be made up with a legal, written excuse. A missed exam for an approved reason MUST be completed prior to returning to the next class meeting. Late work will **NOT** be accepted or graded; assignments will be considered late if posted **after midnight Pacific Standard Time on the day they are due**.

Participation

Your participation (think of this as 'contribution') in the course is monitored and graded. Your interaction with the course content, the instructor, fellow students, and the learning process directly influences your level of success in the course. You need to demonstrate that you have truly completed the assigned readings, shared what you learned from them, and demonstrate understanding and application of the concepts presented. Participation in the course will benefit your overall online experience as well as the experience of others in the course.

Prompt Submission of Assignments
