COURSE DESCRIPTION

The study of right and wrong in principle, character, and conduct; practical moral issues analyzed from the basis of sound moral theory; characteristics of an adequate, consistent code of ethics.

What should I do? Who should I become? Am I really free? Can I objectively distinguish the good from the bad, the happy from the unhappy, the right from the wrong, the more from the less valuable, and the valuable from the worthless? Is there a way to orient myself in the midst of my interests and activities no matter what the circumstances? In this course we will grapple with these and other pressing questions that arise for us, if usually only on the margins of our consciousness, whenever we seriously consider the fact that we are not just being but doing and, by doing, making ourselves and our world. While pursuing these questions for ourselves, we will get to know major, historical approaches to these questions—eudaimonistic, virtue, deontological, consequentialist, utilitarian, and axiological—and will explore the way in which they arose as successive attempts to answer the questions more accurately and completely.

While all students are expected to meet the minimum standards for completion of this course as established by the instructor, students with disabilities may require academic adjustments, modifications or auxiliary aids/services. The DRC's policies and procedures for assisting such students in the development of an appropriate academic adjustment plan (AP) allows PLNU to comply with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act and the Americans with Disabilities Act. If students do not wish to avail themselves of some or all of the elements of their AP in a particular course, it is the responsibility of those students to notify their professor in that course. PLNU highly recommends that DRC students speak with their professors during the first two weeks of each semester about the applicability of their AP in that particular course and/or if they do not desire to take advantage of some or all of the elements of their AP in that course.

PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance at all classes is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent from more than 10 percent of class meetings, the faculty member can file a written report which may result in de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the
