- VI. <u>Text</u>: Russell S., and Norvig, P. <u>Artificial Intelligence: A Modern Approach 3/e</u>, Prentice Hall, 2010.
- VII. <u>Objectives of the course</u>: The student should understand the field of Artificial Intelligence, with an emphasis on problem solving, game playing, learning and perception. In addition, students should gain an appreciation for the difficulty of the problems faced in the field. Students will gain exposure to current research in the area by choosing a research paper related to the chosen term project topic and presenting the results to the class. Students will get a taste of what graduate school is like by completing a term project involving original research.
- VIII. <u>Course Organization</u>: The Course Schedule provides an outline with dates for some of the important activities of the course. Class time will be used for:
  - 1. Introduction of material in the text to be assigned.
  - 2. Discussion of assigned material in the text.
  - 3. Discussion of student questions or class material, including exercises attempted.
  - 4. Laboratory type projects
