

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The history and civilization of Latin America including indigenous and Hispanic cultures of Mexico, Central, and South America from pre-colonial times to the present. Conducted in Spanish.

This course will take you through centuries of Latin American history and culture, in order to trace the development of current identities, societies, and politics. Taking a look back at the grand civilizations (Mayans, Incas, and Aztecs), through the colonial period, the independence movements, various revolutions, dictatorships, and social changes, all the way to current democracies and societies, provides a broad overview of our neighbors to the South. Analyzing Latin America's character through its ideas, literature, film, and popular culture will help you to reflect on your own perspectives and cultural influences. Prerequisite(s): Spanish 251 or consent of instructor.

- 1. Demonstrate (knowledge) a general knowledge of the geographical features of Latin America. (PLO 4, 6)
- Show evidence of an understanding (comprehension, analysis) of the formulation of history. (PLO 4, 6)
- 3. Describe and evaluate (knowledge, analysis) the artistic contributions including, literature, architecture, music, and film. (PLO 4)
- Articulate knowledge (knowledge, analysis) about some quotidian aspects of the cultures studied. (PLO 4, 6)
- 5. Show (knowledge, application) continued development in the use of the Spanish language. (PLO 1, 3, 5)

COURSE SCHEDULE AND ASSIGNMENTS

- Your participation and attendance is mandatory; perfect yet silent attendance will not earn you your
 full participation points. You are expected to arrive on time, having completed the assignment for that
 class period, so that you can ask your questions and participate in the discussion. Note-taking is crucial
 during class and for readings and films, in order to review for exams.
- Your **homework** is to complete all readings thoroughly (dates for completion are on the schedule below), taking notes and jotting down observations and questions for class. You must keep up to date on **Canvas** for assignments and announcements. Homework is deducted 10% per day it is turned in late.
- We have some exciting **field trips** and **films** to accompany our texts. If you miss class and thus miss a film viewing or cannot go with the group on a field trip, you are expected to make up that material on your own time, since it will be included as course material (midterm and final exams).
- You will take an in-class **midterm** exam that will cover all the material, readings, films, and lectures up to that point of the semester. It will be important to take notes during class and as you complete assignments, in order to have material to review and to condense and analyze content into thematic categories and time periods.
- During the semester, you will sign up for a certain day to give a 10-minute **oral presentation**, with visuals (PowerPoint, Prezi), for the class. This presentation can cover a certain theme, author, text or film. You will turn in a 2-3 page written summary of your findings and presentation points, as well as the bibliography, which should include at least 2 academic sources, style standard MLA.
- For the written research paper, style standard MLA, you will choose a topic that aligns with your interests and correlates to the class content. You are expected to include 4 academic sources (help in Ryan Library is available for Latin American topics), a solid thesis/introductory paragraph, and a polished style with academic language and good transitions. In *Spanish*, obvio! 5 pages Times New Roman, font size 12, double-spaced. HARD COPY TURNED IN ON DUE DATE, 3pm; also submitted on Canvas. You will be thinking about and planning your paper in the weeks leading up to the due date, with help from me regarding your thesis. Late papers have a 2/3 letter grade deduction per day past the due date.
- Our **Final exam** will be cumulative and will test your grasp of the semester's themes, specific information/facts, synthesis of the various time period's characteristics. A study guide will be provided, and we will dedicate class time to answer questions and review.
