There are minor changes to the assessment plan. Students graduating in 2012 participated in University-wide assessment coordinated by Office of Institutional Assessment.

There are only limited updates to the data submitted during the last week of September 2011 because we have not yet received the national BEAP data nor the Field Educator final evaluations. This data is only available after completion of SWK473 and Field Educators have up to 30 days to complete and submit.

Similarly the Alumni Survey is distributed in late May. If the deadline for departmental data is going to remain in early May, the data will consistently be for the prior academic year.

Criteria for Success

- 70% of majors will score at or above the national average for social services
- 100% of majors will score 60% or better
- 90% of social work majors will be scored as 2.75 or higher in overall assessment

2012 Results:

ASWB Practice Exam – 100% of graduating student completed a sample ASWB exam. 100% scored at 60% or better with an average score of 70, a range from 60-82 and mode of 70.

Since ther last submittal, the Social Work Program was reviewed by two site evaluators from the Commission on Accreditation of the Council on Social Work Education. The Review found the porgram in compliance with national standards and was subsequently awarded national accreditation until 2016.

Since achieving accreditation, PLNU graduates in social work have been accepted to nationally recognized Masters programs, including but not limited to:

Duke University; Columbia University; University of North Carolina; University of Southern California; Hunter; and to advanced standing at San Diego State University.
