Proposal I: Cross list PHL 321, Social Philosophy, as SOC 321, Social Philosophy.

DEPARTMENT/SCHOOL: Sociology and Social Work

PROPOSAL I: Cross list PHL 321, Social Philosophy, as SOC 321, Social Philosophy.

Rationale:

Social philosophy is an appropriate course for sociology majors. The course enriches the student's understanding of social theory. Some students are now taking the course as an elective.

The instructor and dean of the School of Theology and Christian Ministry concur with this proposal.

The impact of these changes should be a few more students enrolled in the course, but this will not require additional sections, and will have no impact on library or other university services.

SOC 321 (3) SOCIAL PHILOSOPHY

The emergence and development of social philosophy, with consideration given to Critical Theory, Heidegger, Post-Structuralism, and feminist thought. Offered 2007-2008.

Prerequisite: Philosophy 201.

PROPOSAL II: Add SOC 103, Social Problems, to the General Education options for the Social World.

Rationale:

At present options for the general education, the social world, includes six options:

Eco 101 (3) Principles of Economics I

Eco 102 (3) Principles of Economics II

Pol 101 (4) Intro to Political Science

Pol 190 (4) The Politics of Race, Class, and Gender

Soc 101 (3) Intro to Sociology

Soc 201 (3) Cultural Anthropology

The Department of Sociology and Social Work offers one section of Soc 201 and multiple sections of Soc 101 fall and spring terms. The School of Business offers multiple sections of Eco 101 and Eco 102 fall and spring terms. The Department of History and Political Science has offered a single section of Pol 101 in four of the last six semesters and a single section of Pol 190 in three of the last six semesters.

Since the Department of Sociology and Social Work revised the majors in sociology a few years ago, enrollment in Soc 102, Social Problems, has been steadily decreasing.

Social Problems is a standard sociology course, one found in most departments. It can also provide a good introduction to aspects of the study of society.

We are proposing that Social Problems be added as an option for the social world. We think that Social Problems is a good option because it allows exploring the interdependent world both theoretically and practically. A Social Problems course explores problems in contemporary society, such as violence and crime, divorce and abuse, diversity -- race, gender, age, inequality and poverty, globalization and the environment. The course allows discussion of alternative approaches for addressing particular social problems. This is ideal for a Christian liberal arts university.

The Department of Sociology and Social Work has offered one section of Soc 103 per year. This year it was cancelled because of low enrollment. Our expectation is that if Soc 103 were a GE option it would draw students from other GE options offered by this department, i.e., Soc 101 and Soc 201. The economics courses are required by students with majors in the School of Business. These students would mostly continue to take the GE options required by their majors. The majority of other students on campus currently take Soc 101 and Soc 201.

Social Problems has been taught by several of the faculty currently employed, so it presents no issues for staffing. The School of Business and the Department of History and Political Science have no concerns with the proposed addition of additional option for *the Social World*.

General Education Requirements:

PROPOSAL III: Revise naming of sociology majors, to reflect a major in sociology with concentrations in general sociology and criminal justice.

Rationale:

In the 1996–1997 catalog, the *Department of Sociology* had one major, with three emphases: Sociology, Criminal Justice, and Social Work.

In the 1998-1998 catalog, the Department of Sociology had three majors: Sociology with a concentration in Sociology, Sociology with a concentration in Criminal Justice, and Social Work.

In the 2002-2003, the Department of Sociology and Social Work has three majors: Sociology, Sociology with a concentration in Criminal Justice, and Social Work. There had been a recognition that "Sociology with a concentration in Sociology" was an odd if not meaningless phrase.

For all other departments that offer a concentration, there is a core of courses with additional courses that allow the student to focus upon a choice of concentrations. For instance, psychology offers a major in psychology with concentrations in general psychology and therapeutic and community psychology.

There is something awkward about a major in sociology and a major in sociology with a concentration in criminal justice. To remedy this, we propose to relabel the majors offered by the department as Sociology and Social Work. The sociology major would include concentrations in general sociology and criminal justice.

The proposed changes would have no impact on university resources.
