#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This survey course covers Christianity's 2,000 year history by exploring its origins and history in the Middle East, Africa, and Asia. The great expansion of Christianity into Europe and the West will be highlighted while the primary focus will be on more Christian movements and theology from the Global South.

#### **COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES**

- 1. Explain the origins and subsequent spread of Christianity through the work of the early church, missionary activity, and imperial conquests. Name what distinguishes Christianity from other major world religions.
- 2. Recognize and value the gifts that various world regions have contributed to the development and practice of Christianity.
- 3. Demonstrate an understanding of Christian scripture, tradition, and ethics, including engagement in acts of devotion and works of mercy. Develop an awareness and sensitivity of the implications and significance of Christianity in a global context.
