

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Art 104 is a foundation course which is designed to introduce the student to the theories and practice of contemporary, three-dimensional art and design. The coursework addresses the interrelationship between the elements of art and the principles of design as a visual language used to respond to the environment and works of art and design. We will explore various media and techniques, with emphasis being placed on the formal aspects of art and design, three dimensional composition and the activation and creation of space. The course is designed as a foundation for any three dimensional practice, including sculpture, architecture and industrial design.

COURSE REOUIREMENTS

FIVE STUDIO PROJECTS

In the course of the semester we will complete six major projects. Each project is specifically structured to focus on a particular skill and enhance the students ability to think and create in three-dimensional space. They will proceed through the following five stages.

- Each project will be introduced with a handout, slide lecture and discussion specifying parameters, expectations and due dates.
- A preliminary review may be conducted one week into the project so that you can receive feedback from the class and instructor
- You are expected to make good use of class work days. This is when you can take full advantage of the instructor if you need technical advice or help with equipment.

- A formal critique of each completed project will take place at a specified time. Each student will turn in an artist's statement and be expected to discuss the formal aspects of their work with the class. Projects are due at the beginning of the class period on the specified critique date.
- After projects are critiqued and graded it is your responsibility to remove them from the art department.

CRITIQUES PARTICIPATION

Critiques provide an opportunity constructive criticism that helps the artist/designer to understand the strengths and weaknesses of their work. Each student is expected to contribute to this discussion. In fact your participation grade is based in part on your willingness to join in during the critique. If you are absent from a critique your project is considered late, and the highest grade you can receive for that project is a "B-". There is no way of making up the points lost for missing a critique or for not participating in the discussion.

CELL PHONES

CLEAN UP

Art, by its nature is a messy process. It is important that you clean up after yourself. This includes the classroom and anywhere else that you might work. These are areas that we all share and use, so be courteous and leave your work area as clean as or cleaner then you found it. If you habitually neglect to clean up after yourself your final grade can be lowered by a full letter grade.

SAFETY AND OPEN SHOP

This semester the students will be instructed in the safe and proper use of several power tools and use of the departments facilities. Some of these tools and equipment have an inherent element of danger related to their use. Failure to follow proper instruction or to use proper safety equipment will result in the lowering of your grade, a ban from using our facilities, not to mention possible injury.

If you do not feel comfortable using any equipment, it is not required for the course.

Open shop will take place on Tuesday evening and Friday afternoon. This is an excellent opportunity to continue working on your projects, get additional feedback from the instructor, or get more comfortable with the facilities.

STORAGE

When possible, the art dept tries to provide students with storage areas for larger materials and works in progress. For smaller items you can claim a locker by putting a Master Lock on an empty locker and registering the combination with Allyson in the art dept. office. Be sure to mark all materials that belong to you.

FINAL GRADE BREAKDOWN

Grades will be based on a total number of points accumulated in weighted categories throughout the semester.

Studio Projects 60% (100 pts each)

Participation 15% Written Work 15% Homework 10%

A more specific breakdown of how individual projects are to be evaluated and possible point available will be provided in a handout upon the introduction of each project.

ATTENDANCE

- · Meets Project Objectives
- Effort
- Composition
- · Craftsmanship/Technical
- Concept/Creativity

Assignments turned in late will receive an automatic one letter grade deduction. For each additional day the assignment is late an additional letter grade will be deducted.
