Sea Lions Finish 24th in NACDA Director's Cup Standings

CLEVELAND, Ohio - Point Loma Nazarene finished 24th out of nearly 300 schools in the final NAIA Learfield Directors' Cup Standings as announced Friday. The Sea Lion athletic program notched 415.50 total points during the 2010-11 school year.

The Directors' Cup is presented annually to the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country in NCAA Divisions I, II, and III and the NAIA. Points are earned by a school's postseason advancement in each intercollegiate sport. A national championship collects 100 points for a university; a second-place finish garners 90 points; each place below second earns a designated amount of points depending on the size of the field. Only the six top men's teams and six top women's teams are tallied in a school's final results.

The Sea Lion volleyball team earned the most points, 75, after placing fifth at nationals. Both of PLNU's tennis teams also placed fifth, each earning 70 points. Women's track pulled in 67.5 points after coming in 10th; men's track was 23rd for 50 points; men's golf was 15th for 45 points and women's cross country earned 40 points with a 17th place finish.

Fellow Golden State Athletic Conference school Azusa Pacific (Calif.) has claimed the top spot in the final standings. The Cougars tallied 820.75 total points in taking home their seventh straight Learfield Sports Directors' Cup. The GSAC remains atop the conference standings, with four of its member institutions in the top 10 (Azusa Pacific (Calif.) - first; Fresno Pacific (Calif.) - fourth; California Baptist - sixth; Concordia (Calif.) - eighth).

Other GSAC institutions in the standings were Biola (11), PLNU (24), Vanguard (37), Westmont (70) and The Master's (77).

Embry Riddle Aeronautical (Fla.) finished in second following a fifth place finish in baseball. The Eagles end the year with 752.25 total points. The Hawks of Shorter (Ga.) finished in the top five for the first time in the third place spot with 741.00 total points. In fourth place with 719.75 total points is Fresno Pacific (Calif.). Lindenwood (Mo.) rounds out the top-five with 686.75 total points.

All eight spring NAIA championships have been completed to date with the following institutions capturing titles: baseball - Concordia (Calif.); women's golf - California Baptist; men's golf - Oklahoma Christian; softball - Oregon Tech; women's tennis - Auburn Montgomery (Ala.); men's tennis - Fresno Pacific (Calif.); women's track & field - Concordia (Ore.); men's track & field - Shorter (Ga.). PLNU missed placing in the top-20 for the first time in 13 NACDA rankings. The university's best-ever finish was fourth overall in 2004-05. The Sea Lions were 16th in 2009-10.

Golden State Athletic Conference Accomplishments



The 2010-11 season was another great year with **4** teams from the Golden State Athletic Conference winning NAIA championships during the 2010-11 season. In **25** years of competition, GSAC teams have now won a total of **40** national championships in 12 out of 13 sports sponsored by the conference. In the classroom, over **50** GSAC teams were NAIA Scholar Teams. *National Coach of the Year* and *NAIA Player of the Year* awards were given to 3 GSAC coaches and 4 GSAC athletes. In the final standings of the Learfield Sports Directors' Cup, which recognizes the best overall athletic programs in the NAIA based on showings in national championship tournaments and meets, **Azusa Pacific** received the NAIA's top award for a record-breaking **seventh** year in a row and was joined by **Fresno Pacific**, **California Baptist**, **Concordia** and **Biola** in the top 11. A total of 9 conference teams made the rankings, all finishing in the top 80. Below is a summary of this year's highlights.

In non-GSAC sports, conference members had top performances. **Fresno Pacific** repeated as the NAIA Men's Swimming & Diving Champion, followed by **California Baptist** in second. **Peter Richardson** of Fresno Pacific was selected as the NAIA Men's Coach of the Year. In Women's Swimming & Diving, **California Baptist** earned first place, with **Fresno Pacific** in second and **Azusa Pacific** in fifth. **Rick Rowland** of California Baptist was the NAIA Women's Coach of the Year and **Alex Peters** of Concordia was the Women's Outstanding Meet Performer.

California Baptist won the NAIA Women's Golf Championship. In NAIA Women's Indoor Track & Field, **Azusa Pacific** finished third and **Biola** fourth, while **Azusa Pacific** finished in fourth on the men's side. **Natasha Miller** of Biola was named the Women's Most Outstanding Performer.
