COURSE DESCRIPTION

A study of the physical, social, emotional and cognitive growth and development of the child, from the prenatal period through the adolescent years. Classroom lectures and course readings are supplemented through laboratory experience in two settings and appropriate projects. Four (4) semester unit credits.

- 7. Develop guidelines in the selection of materials, artistic and recreational activities, and play equipment according to the child's age, interest, and developmental stage.
- 8. Develop an understanding of children's behavior as a basis for appropriate decision making.
- 9. Develop an awareness of current research as it impacts the growth and development of children.
