Course Description

A survey of the human communication process. Emphasis is placed on intrapersonal, interpersonal, and public communication. Particular attention is paid to the preparation and presentation of speeches.

Course Learning Outcomes

Students who successfully complete this course will:

- 1. Be able to describe and discuss the process of human communication.
- 2. Be able to identify and explain the basic components of an effective speech.
- 3. Be challenged to interact competently in dyadic, and small group experiences.
- 4. Be able to construct and deliver informational and persuasive speeches.

Assessment and Grading

Below you will find the assignments for the semester. Speeches will have grading rubrics that you are welcome to view before giving your speech. Your final grade will be calculated by dividing the number of points you earn by the total number of points at the end of the semester. It is your responsibility to keep track of your grades in Canvas.

- Speeches: Intro Speech (c/nc), Informative Speech (100 pts), Persuasive Speech (100 pts), Commemorative Speech (30 pts), Group Speech & Outline (50 pts), Impromptu Speeches (points vary).
- Outlines: Informative Outline (15 pts), Persuasive Outline (15 pts)
- Assignments: Research Assignment (15 pts), Peer Feedback (18 pts), Speech Analysis journals (points vary)
- Quizzes: points vary
- Exams: points vary

Grade Scale

A- = 90-92%; A = 93-100%: Excellent (superior, first rate/class, exceptional, superlative paper and tests; engaged in class lecture and discussion, attendance, posture, interest, etc. Comprehensive excellence is needed for a superlative grade in this course.

B- = 80-82%; B = 83-87%; B+ = 88-89%: Above average

C- = 70-72%; C = 73-77%; C+ = 78-79%: Average (mediocre, commonplace, ordinary, passable, fair, midpoint between extremes of excellence and failure.)

D- = 60-63%; D = 64-67%; D+ = 68-69%: Below average

F = 59% and below: Failure (*omission or lack of satisfactory performance of action or task, inadequate, impassable, etc.*)

Method of Instruction/Norms

- 1. Students are expected to come to class on time, stay for the duration, and <u>not</u> carry on side conversations during lecture. In other words, students are expected to be active participants in the learning process.
- 2. Failure to make presentations on schedule will result in a failing grade for that presentation. In the event of absence students seek missed information/notes from classmates.
- 3. PLNU allows up to 25% of course work to be completed in Canvas and this section of COM 1000 will utilize it to a great degree. Canvas has your assignments listed with due dates set and all the materials needed for the course beyond the textbook so be sure to set your Canvas user preference to get daily reminders for assignments due. All written work must be typed, and attention should be paid to form (including grammar, punctuation, spelling, APA formatting and general appearance) as well as content. Late work will receive an automatic point deduction.
- 4. Classroom disruption by cell phones or other electronic devices (i.e. text messaging) is prohibited. All cell phones and similar electronic devices must remain turned off and out of sight for the duration of class. A student may face a zero and/or failure in the class if an electronic device is used for cheating during a test.
- 5. Please DO NOT disrupt class while students are presenting. This includes walking in and out of the classroom.
- 6. Integrity is of great importance. Plagiarism of any sort will not be tolerated and will result in a grade of "F" for the project and possibly the course.

Attendance & Participation

Regular and punctual attendance at all classes is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent from more than 10 percent of class meetings, the faculty member has the option of filing a written report which may result in de-enrollment.
