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Executive Summary

Highights of the WASC Alumni Survey administered in Fall 2015

- † The alumni survey shows an increase in preparedness, particularly in the areas of self-understanding and values and ethics.
- † Church engagement and personal faith activities have generally increased in frequency, particularly in study group participation and personal bible reading. However, church and worship attendance has generally not changed.
- † Church involvement has somewhat moved away from simple monetary giving to more time-related service. Fewer alumni are giving money, but more alumni are leading study groups, teaching Sunday school, or serving in other capacities. The survey bias of a higher proportion of younger respondents may explain some of this.
- † Feedback from alumni in terms of their perception of PLNU's contribution to the enhancement of their learning is very positive. Very few alumni report no enhancement except in areas of diversity and technology. High marks are achieved in the areas of analytical thinking, knowledge integration, life-long learning, and teamwork.
- † 9 of the 11 learning outcomes areas touched on in the survey show improvement since the 2012 survey administration. Oral communication and Knowledge integration show the most improvement, while technology and written communication show slight decline.
- † A substantial proportion of alumni seek out perspectives and opinions from others, and to a lesser extent, feel their work is a service to God and make a connection between their life and career.
- † PLNU had a positive impact on alumni in terms of sensitivity and concern for others, as well as, their willingness to wrestle with moral and ethical issues. By contrast, there was less of a positive impact in the area of cultural impact.
- † In terms of personal values, PLNU alumni place the most importance on raising a family and helping others in difficulty. These are by far rated more important than things like finances, career advancement, or staying abreast of current events.
- † More than 80% of alumni report interactions with people who challenged their beliefs, seeking perspecive and opinions of others, and dining with people of differing racial backgrounds. However, a smaller percentage of alumni report worshiping with people of differing racial backgrounds.
- † While 60-70% of PLNU alumni practice healthy habits most or almost all of the time, participation is diminishing as frequency of aerobic exercise, adequate sleep, and eating a balanced diet is lower than what was reported by alumni three years ago.

Survey Administration Details

Survey Administration Details

- † The 2015 administration of the WASC alumni survey was done through two populations. One population consisted of all students from PLNU's Survey Panel who have graduated. The other population consisted of a random sample of bachelor's degree recipients who have graduated since Summer 2000 and were not part of the Survey Panel. The Panel respondents were given a small incentive, the non-Panel respondents were not.
 - Note: The Survey Panel consists of one cohort (approx. 200 students) per year. The Panel is initially created from a randomly selected group of freshmen who consent to take multiple surveys over their years at PLNU and after they graduate. Since some of these freshmen leave PLNU before they graduate, a proportional sample of incoming transfers join the Survey Panel cohorts each year.
- † The Survey Panel population contained 189 alumni of whom 101 responded (a Panel response rate of 53.4%). The non-Panel population contained a random sample of 1,435 alumni of whom 443 responded (a non-Panel response rate of 30.9%). This resulted in an overall response rate of 33.5%
- † The initial survey solicitation was delivered via e-mail directing alumni to complete the survey online. Subsequent to that, non-respondents were then sent a paper version with a stamped return envelope. Several reminders, both through electronic and traditional mail were sprinkled throughout the process.
- † The addition of the Survey Panel in the 2015 administration resulted in a much higher proportion of "recent" graduates causing some sample bias when comparing the 2015 results against the results from the 2012 administration.
- † Also, the 2015 administration did not include any master's degree recipients. Whereas, the 2012 administration had included those alumni.

- † 2015 respondents reported feeling better prepared across all areas in comparison to the respondents from 2012 survey.
- † 87.9% of 2015 repondents felt that PLNU prepared them for well or very well for working outside the home.
- † 78.6% of 2015 repondents felt that PLNU prepared them for well or very well for attending graduate school.
- † 88.2% of 2015 repondents felt that PLNU prepared them for well or very well for developing their system of values and ethics.
- [†] Two areas showed substantial increases in preparedness from 2012 to 2015. "Understanding yourself" went from 78.5% (well and very well) to 87.2% and "Developing your system of values and ethics" went from 78.9% (well and very well) to 88.2%.

- † Frequency of church attendance has changed very little between 2012 and 2015. 57.8% of 2015 respondents attend a worship service at least weekly compared to the 57.3% of 2012 respondents.
- † Frequency of private prayer is up from 2012 with 82.3% of 2015 respondents praying at least weekly compared to 79.5% in 2012.
- † 53.7% of 2015 respondents read the Bible in their home at least weekly. This is an increase over the 48.1% of 2012 respondents.
- † Study group participation is up with 39.4% of 2015 respondents participating at least weekly in a prayer or Christian study group. Compared to 32.5% of 2012 respondents.
- † Participation in local evangelism has declined since 2012. Over half (58.4%) of 2015 respondents join in local evangelism rarely, if ever, compared to 44.8% of 2012 respondents.
- [†] However, participation in global missions work has increased a little since 2012. Two-thirds (68.7%) of 2015 respondents join in global missions work rarely, if ever, compared to almost three-fourths (73.7%) of 2012 respondents.

- † Generally, church involvement is more frequent among 2015 respondents that that of the 2012 respondents with the exception of monetary giving.
- † Monetary giving of at least a few times a month has decreased from 57.2% of 2012 respondents to 44.1% of 2015 respondents.
- t Leadership frequency, in terms of study groups and Sunday school, of at least a few times a month has increased among alumni from 21.2% of 2012 respondents to 25.3% of 2015 respondents.
- † Respondents' use of professional skills to assist the church increased. 21.8% of 2015 respondents did this at least a few times a month compared to 17.0% of 2012 respondents.
- † Frequency of compassionate ministry service also increased with 16.7% of 2015 respondents doing this at least a few times a month compared to 13.7% of 2012 respondents.
- † There was very little change in the frequency of involvement in the areas of corporate worship and elected leadership.

[†] There is an interesting polarization in the area of personal relationships. This area among all SLOs has the highest proportion of 2015 respondents rating it "very much enhanced" while this area has the 3rd highest proportion of 2015 respondents rating it "not enhanced.

[†] Two SLO areas that show relatively large proportions of a "not enhanced" rating from 2015 respondents are "seeking cross-cultural experiences" (17.1%) and "using technology" (17.4%).

[†] The two SLO areas that showed the most collective improvement between the 2012 and 2015 respondents were "Developing meaningful personal relationships" (from an average of 2.93 to 3.13) and "Thinking analytically and logically" (from an average of 2.93 to 3.10).

- [†] Four of the six areas addressed in this question show an interesting increase in polarization in terms of the impact PLNU had on repondents' experiences. Commitment to Christ, life of service to society, understanding people of differing racial backgrounds, and affirmation of the equality of all people all showed increases (from 2012 to 2015) in both the proportion of respondents who agreed or strongly agreed and the proportion of respondents who disagreed or strongly disagreed.
- † 87.2% of 2015 respondents agreed or strongly agreed that PLNU had a positive impact on their willingness to wrestle with moral and ethical issues. This is up from 82.5% of the 2012 respondents.
- † 83.9% of 2015 respondents agreed or strongly agreed that PLNU had a positive impact on their sensitivity toward and concern for others. This is up from 78.9% of the 2012 respondents.
- † Of these six areas, PLNU's impact on the understanding of people of differing racial backgrounds had the lowest proportion (60.8%) of 2015 respondents who agreed or strongly agreed with that statement.

- † Over half (56.7%) of 2015 respondents feel raising a family is of "essential" importance. This is by far the highest percentage among the areas addressed in this question.
- † 86.7% of 2015 respondents feel helping others who are in diffculty is either essential or very important. This is a little higher than the 81.2% of 2015 respondents who feel raising a family is either essential or very important. The difference here is shown in the 5.4% of 2015 respondents who feel raising a family is not important.
- † The lowest importance was placed on involvement in programs to clean up the environment and becoming a community leader with 22.3% and 22.0% of 2015 respondents (respectively) rating them as not important.

- † 57.0% of 2015 respondents disagree or strongly disagreed with the statement "I lost my temper in a situation at work." This is an increase over the 52.6% of 2012 respondents.
- † Almost all (93.1%) 2015 respondents agreed or strongly agreed that they have sought out the perspectives and opinions of others.

[†] The percentage of respondents who volunteered time to a Christian organization has increased from 50.9% in 2012 to 57.9% in 2015. Volunteer time for the poor has also increased, but not as much, from 45.5% of 2012 respondents to 49.8% of 2015 respondents.

[†] The percentage of respondents who gave money to a Christian organization has decreased from 71.8% in 2012 to 68.6% in 2015. However, monetary donations to charity increased slightly from 64.8% of 2012 respondents to 65.8% of 2015 respondents.

[†] Monetary giving for disaster relief is relatively low and has decreased substantially from 37.0% of 2012 respondents to 26.3% of 2015 respondents.
