IPPS Events and Activities During the 2015-16 Academic Year:

Insider Insights Seminar – November 2015

At this on-campus seminar held in the Colt Forum, three community "insiders" – Elyse Lowe (Deputy Director of Developmental Services with the City of San Diego), Sarah Lubeck (Communications Manager with the San Diego Economic Development Corporation), and Michael de la Rosa (Policy Advisor to County Supervisor Greg Cox) – spoke to a group of fifteen students about public affairs career planning, professional development, networking, and graduate school.

Kettering Foundation Visit – November 2015

Last fall, I was invited to attend a two day research exchange at the Kettering Foundation in Dayton, Ohio. This research exchange (titled "College Students Talk Politics") brought a group of academics together to discuss a book project on student political engagement. The book will

include my chapter on political participation exercises as a means of teaching civic skills and will be published by the end of the year.

Lunch Seminar with Matt Leighninger – February 2016

Matt Leighninger, director of the Yankelovich Center for Public Judgment and head of Public Agenda's public engagement and democratic governance sector, came to PLNU for a lunch seminar in Colt Forum. He spoke to a group of students about civic engagement, deliberative democracy, and civic affairs career opportunities.

Life After Loma: Recent Graduates Panel – April 2016

This on-campus panel consisted of four recent graduates from the Department of History and Political Science: Daniel Nadal (2011), Rachel Christensen (2012), Lydia Kravchuk (2014), and Bree Burris (2015). All four of these students are currently working in San Diego in the field of law or public affairs. Fourteen students attended the panel and listened to advice on entering the job market, making the most of an internship, and the importance of networking.

San Diego Deliberation Network

This year, I continued my involvement with the San Diego Deliberation Network, a collaborative of nine individuals (representing all major universities in the area, as well as the League of Women Voters) dedicated to fostering civil civic dialogue in San Diego. We meet monthly to discuss our mission, plan deliberative forums, and organize our finances (we recently decided to become a 501c3 organization). During the 2015-16 academic year, we held three health care forums in three different locations: the San Diego Central Library, San Diego Community College, and the Oceanside Public Library. Over the next year, we will continue training students to take part in these forums as facilitators (thus far, students from PLNU, USD, and CSUSM have been trained).

Some of the IPPS Events Planned for the 2016-17 Academic Year:

September 2016 – "Bring it to the Table" Documentary Screening

This fall, IPPS will be screening the documentary "Bring it to the Table," a documentary and engagement campaign "aimed at bridging political divides and elevating the national conversation about issues that matter to us all." The documentary is a platform for stoking healthy political conversations and is "for those who want to listen to what their fellow students, neighbors, friends, family members, and even total strangers, really think."

November 2016 – Internship Seminar

This is IPPS's annual internship seminar, where I discuss with students the ins-and-outs of interning, job searching, and prepping for post-PLNU life. I will also invite a recent PLNU graduate to speak to them about career planning and the importance of internships.

January 2017 – "Coffee and Politics" Speaker Series Reception

Each year, IPPS invites a local community leader to speak to students about politics and current affairs. Tentatively, this year's invited guest will be the political writer, Ruben Navarrette, who is, according to Media Matters, the most widely read Latino columnist in the country, and the 16th most popular columnist in America.

Ongoing – LEAD San Diego (IMPACT program)

I have been selected to participate in LEAD San Diego's IMPACT program, "a nine-month series of full-day issues-focused seminars, plus optional sessions, designed to give participants a greater understanding of the critical issues and key players in our region, motivating them to use their skills to become engaged." This program will help connect me with the broader San Diego community, granting me access to future IPPS speakers and internship providers.

Over the last few years, I have worked hard to grow IPPS's roots in San Diego, linking both PLNU and IPPS to the San Diego public affairs community. As part of this effort, I was involved in the following ways during the 2015-16 academic year:
