COURSE DESCRIPTION

Conceptual development of the calculus of functions of more than one variable supported by the use of a symbolic computer algebra system. Limits and continuity, partial derivatives, chain rule, extreme values, Taylor's theorem, multiple integrals, line and surface integrals, Green's Theorem and Stokes' Theorem.

Comment

We will try and avoid the following pitfall:

At the beginning college level, visualization is a big part of understanding. Consequently, students who are operating with few mental pictures are not really learning mathematics. Their calculus consists of a vast series of algorithms and a complicated cataloging system which tells them which procedure is used when. The effort put into this kind of teaching and learning is largely wasted: memorized algorithms are soon forgotten and, worse still, such courses perpetuate the idea that math involves doing calculations rather than thinking.

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

Graded Components

- Homework: Homework will be assigned every class meeting. All homework assigned in a week will be due on Tuesday of the following week. No late homework will be accepted except by prior arrangement (with me) or with a documented emergency. The object of the homework is to learn how to do the problems so there should be calculations on your homework using the terminology and methods of the class and not just an answer. Homework will be scored on a combination of completeness (with work shown) and correctness. A random selection (the same for all people) of the problems will be graded on any homework assignment. The two lowest homework scores will be dropped.
- Quizzes: There will be weekly quizzes. Quiz questions will come from the readings and videos assigned before each class session. No late quizzes are accepted except by prior arrangement (with me) or with a documented emergency. The object of the quizzes is to assess what you learned from the videos and readings. The two lowest quiz scores will be dropped.
- Collaborative Work: Each week there will be an assignment to be completed in small groups. There is almost a century of research showing that academic achievement, productivity, and self-esteem improve dramatically when students work together in groups. This method emphasizes teamwork, cooperation and support by others, rather than isolation and competition in learning.
- Exams: There are three exams. The exams will include problems and questions over material assigned in the text, readings and handouts, as well as material presented in class. If you do not take an exam you will receive a zero for it. Late exams may be taken only by prior arrangement with me or a well-documented emergency beyond your control. The examination schedule is included in the daily schedule. I do not intend to accept excuses such as poor communication with parents, benefactors, sport team sponsors and/or travel agents.
- **Final Exam**: The final is **comprehensive** and is on Wednesday, December 2 7:30 to 10:00 a.m. The final exam date and time is set by the university at the beginning of the semester and may not be changed by the instructor.

Grading Scale

Grades are based on the number of points accumulated throughout the course with the following exception. A student must pass at least one of Exam 1, Exam 2, Exam 3 or the Final Exam in order to pass the class. That is, a score of 60% must be achieved on one of the Exams, or else the final grade will be an F regardless of all other point totals. STATE AUTHORIZATION
