#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

A continuation of Calculus I supported by the use of computer graphics and a symbolic computer algebra system. Methods of integration, sequences, series, elementary differential equations, polar coordinates and parametric equations.

Prerequisites: MTH 1064 or MTH 1044, or equivalent.

#### ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

# **Graded Components**

- Collaborative Activity Labs: The labs are due at the scheduled dates and times, and are submitted ONLY in Word, Excel, or .pdf format in Canvas (e.g. Google Docs and Apple Numbers are not permitted). These labs are to be completed in pairs. (Please sign up in CANVAS for your lab partner). There is almost a century of research showing that academic achievement, productivity, and self-esteem improve dramatically when students work together in groups. This method emphasizes teamwork, cooperation and support by others, rather than isolation and competition in learning.
- Homework: Online homework (denoted OH) will be completed in WebAssign. Written Homework will be assigned every class meeting. All Written homework assigned in a week will be due on Monday of the following week. No late homework will be accepted except by prior arrangement (with me) or with a documented emergency. The object of the homework is to learn how to do the problems so there should be calculations on your homework using the terminology and methods of the class and not just an answer. Written Homework will be scored on a combination of completeness (with work shown) and correctness. A random selection (the same for all people) of the problems will be graded on any homework assignment. The two lowest Written homework scores will be dropped.

- **Notes and Videos**: Each section will have videos to watch and you should take notes. Your notes will be submitted in a weekly Canvas Discussion to provide evidence you are keeping up.
- Examinations and the Final Examination. Examinations and the Final Examination will include problems and questions over material assigned in the text, readings and handouts, as well as material presented in class. No examination shall be missed without prior consent or a well-documented emergency beyond your control. A score of zero will be assigned for an examination that is missed without prior consent or a well-documented emergency beyond your control. The final exam date and time is set by the university at the beginning of the semester and may not be changed by the instructor. This schedule can be found on the university website and in the course calendar. No requests for early examinations will be approved. Only in the case that a student is required to take three exams during the same day of finals week, is an instructor authorized to consider changing the exam date and time for that particular student.
- Late work will not be accepted without prior consent or a well-documented emergency. Up to a maximum of one homework assignment will be accepted up to 3 days late provided that consent is received from the professor before it is due. Homework assignments that are submitted late without prior consent will be recorded with a score of zero.
- The examination schedule is included in the daily schedule. This instructor does not intend to accept excuses such as poor communication with parents, benefactors, surf team sponsors and/or travel agents.

## **Grading Scale**

Grades are based on the number of points accumulated throughout the course with the following exception. A student must pass at least one of Exam 1, Exam 2, or the Final Exam in order to pass the class. That is, a score of 60% must be achieved on one of the Exams, or else the final grade will be an F regardless of all other point totals. #### STATE AUTHORIZATION

## PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Remote students and/or all student (while we are in tier purple)

Students taking online courses are expected to attend each week of the course. Attendance is defined as participating in an academic activity within the online classroom which includes posting in a graded activity in the course. (Note: Logging into the course does not qualify as participation and will not be counted as meeting the attendance requirement.)

Students who do not attend at least once in any 3 consecutive days will be issued an attendance warning. Students who do not attend at least once in any 7 consecutive days will be dropped from the course retroactive to the last date of recorded attendance.

#### Policy for non-remote students and meeting face-to-face.

Attendance is expected at each class session. In the event of an absence you are responsible for the material covered in class and the assignments given that day.

Regular and punctual attendance at all classes is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent from more than 10 percent of class meetings, the faculty member can file a written report which may result in de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive the appropriate grade for their work and participation.
