- Completed Contract: filled out by the student: mapping out scope of the proposed Personal Project.
- Signed and approved Contract: by the professor
- Design: Construction method (are there any demos or construction methods that need to be learned
- Concept: Research of artists, culture or history
- Process+Time: Calendar, experimental phase, Due date...and goal of final product
- Research Documentation: should include written notes, sketches, images, process images and final images
- Formal Presentation in Class Critique
- CANVAS Submission Upon completion of Personal Project, you will upload a single PDF file.

Class Projects

- You now all have a better understanding of how the ceramics lab operates. This includes experience of handbuilding and wheel throwing, Glazing and the firing process. These class projects are designed to enable you to participate more on the day to day oppositions of maintaining the Lab. Some of the jobs you will be exposed to are:
- Clay mixing, Glaze mixing, creating classroom improvements such as samples, texture tiles, chucks, glaze
 testers. These items and serve to benefit future ceramics learning for new students as well as improving the
 life and function of the ceramics lab.
- · Consult with the professor to discuss a job or jobs that qualify for the completion of this assignment.

Final

- At the end of the semester we will gather as a class to discuss and share our challenges and successes
 of working with clay. Each student will have an opportunity to share some insights into their experience
 as well as reflect on their peers works too.
- In addition the remainder of the class time will be spent packing up your ceramic work, and assisting in a deep clean of the community lab space and kiln room.
- Participation is expected of everyone.

Class Participation (5 points each class for a total of 15 weeks)

• A student who expresses ideal class participation is one who comes to class prepared, works hard during class hours, cleans up after oneself, fully participates in class discussions as well as in-class critique.
