COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an examination of the federal constitutional provisions which impact the criminal justice system with an emphasis on the amendments in the Bill of Rights dealing with searches and seizures by law enforcement officers, the exclusionary rule, the privilege against self-incrimination, the rights to due process and the assistance of counsel, the death penalty, and constraints on the correctional system.

- Identify the elements of an arrest and exceptions to the warrant requirement.
- 5. Understand the requirements surrounding the search and seizure of things, including motor vehicles.

- 6. Articulate the standards governing confessions.
- 7. Apply principles of criminal procedure to unique fact patterns.
- 8. Analyze how the Constitution places limits on police power.
- 9. Assess the objectives and effectiveness of different forms of punishment.
- 10. Integrate faith and Biblical principles when applying constitutional rights.

ASSIGNMENTS

1. Reading/Lecture Notes

You are expected to complete the assigned reading content pages within the first two days of the week so the reading can inform your contribution to the course.

2. Attendance/Participation

Students are required to attend the weekly face-to-face session of the course. Each week students will participate in online and in-class discussions with classmates, which are related to the week's readings and content. Students must be present for in-class activities, projects, and presentations. Although the attendance policy within the College of Extended Learning permits one missed class session per course, it does not excuse missing a deadline for a project, activity, or presentation. If a student is absent from class when there is an in-class project or presentation due, the student cannot submit it late for credit **Attendance/Participation represent 15% of the overall course grade.**

3. Discussions

Each week students will participate in online discussions with classmates, which are related to the week's readings and content. These discussions replace the interactive dialogue that occurs in the traditional classroom setting. **Discussions represent 15** %

of the overall course grade.

4. Assignments

There are written assignments and activities due in Weeks One through Week Sevel of this course. These assignments must reflect college-level writing and critical thinking and include synthesizing reading and analyzing fact patterns (scenarios). **Assignments represent 25% of the overall course grade.**

5. Quizzes

There is a quiz due weeks one through seven. These quizzes are taken from the text reading, the online reading/videos, and classroom discussions. **Quizzes represent 10%** of the overall course grade.

6. Final Project

Everything you have learned in this course will help you be successful in this assignment. Final Project represents 35% of the overall course grade

Asynchronous Attendance/Participation Definition

A day of attendance in asynchronous content is determined as contributing a substantive note, assignment, discussion, or submission by the posted due date. Failure to meet these standards will result in an absence for that day. Instructors will determine how many asynchronous attendance days are required each week.

NOTE: Hybrid

At Point Loma Nazarene University, attendance is required at all scheduled classes. Adult Degree Completion courses are taught in the hybrid format, which means some class meetings will be face-to-face and some will be online. Attendance in the face-to-face classes is to be for the entire time of the class. Arriving late or leaving early will be considered a partial absence. A day of attendance in an online class is determined as contributing a substantive note, assignment, discussion, or submission that adds value to the course as determined by the instructor. Three days of attendance are required each week.

In blended or hybrid courses, if a student misses one face-to-face class then the faculty member will send an email to the student and the Director of Student Success warning of attendance jeopardy. There are no exceptions to this policy. If a student misses two face-to-face classes, the faculty member or Vice Provost for Academic Administration (VPAA) will initiate the student's de-enrollment from the course without further advanced notice to the student. If the date of de-enrollment is past the last date to withdraw from a class, the student will be assigned a grade of "F" and there will be no refund of tuition for that course.

Online Portion of the Hybrid Course

If a student misses two online classes (fails to contribute to a discussion board) during the course, then the faculty member will send an email to the student and the Program Director warning of attendance jeopardy. There are no exceptions to this policy.

If a student misses three online classes (fails to contribute to a discussion board by the due date) during the course, then the faculty member or Vice Provost for Academic Administration (VPAA) will initiate the student's de-enrollment from the course without further advanced notice

to the student. If the date of de-enrollment is past the last date to withdraw from a class, the student will be assigned a grade of "F" and there will be no refund of tuition for that course.
