Introductory Post (10 points) + Discussion Posts (10 points x 4)

Reading Graphic Organizer (13 @ 25 points each - Graded as Credit / No Credit)

- You are required to submit a Reading Graphic Organizer once per week.
- The Reading Graphic Organizer allows students to record ideas, feedback, questions, and new perspectives from their fellow classmates.
 This portion is to be completed in Small Groups Synchronously, and it is worth 15 points as credit / no credit. No points will be awarded for this portion if the student did not participate with their small group.
- o Small Group participation assessment will be done twice in the semester, by group peers, anonymously.

Multiple Choice on Canvas: Key Terms Quizzes (4 @ 15 points each)

- The short quizzes are Multiple Choice only, and they test your knowledge of Key Terms.
- · Quizzes will be available in Canvas, and due in the weeks they are assigned. No late quizzes are accepted.

Documentary Commentary (20 points)

- o The link to the documentaries will be made available on Canvas.
- Each student may choose which one they want to watch. Then, turn in a 1-page analysis. (See Documentary Film Commentary form.)
- The documentary commentary provides the student with the opportunity to assess the content of the documentary, as well as to assess their own learning experience as a result of watching it.

Primary Source Analysis Paper 1 (130 points Total)

- You are required to write one paper analyzing a primary source (text-based document) during the semester. This assignment is scaffolded as follows:
 - Primary Source Selection (WK3) 5 points
 - Primary Source Introduction (WK6) 15 points
 - Primary Source Summary (WK8) 20 points
 - Primary Source Analysis and Works Cited (WK11) 40 points
 - Primary Source Peer Review (WK 12) 20 points
 - Primary Source Final Draft (WK14) 30 points
- Specifications on what to include and how to conduct an analysis of a Primary Source are outlined under Primary Source Analysis
 Specifications.
- Each Scaffold / Step must build on the other and be turned in each time a new step is added. Comments / corrections should be part of this step-by-step process.
- An assignment cannot be turned in twice in hopes of receiving a better grade.

Unit Tests (2 @ 45 points each - Unit 1 and Unit 2)

- The Unit Tests are open RGO, essay exams given in Canvas. Plagiarism / cheating will result in a failing grade. (Turnitin.com will scan the responses.)
- No late exams are accepted, unless the student has received permission because of extenuating circumstances prior to the availability period
 for the exam and with proper evidence for the excuse.

Cumulative Final Exam (100 Points)

- The Final Exam is an open RGO, essay exam. Plagiarism / cheating will result in a failing grade. It is a written exam. No laptops or phones allowed.
- Successful completion of this class requires taking the final examination on its scheduled day. The final examination schedule is posted on the Class Schedules No requests for early examinations or alternative days will be approved.

Additional Notes:

- In writing research and analytical papers for a history class, it is essential to give proper acknowledgement to the source from which information is used whether that information is a direct quote, a paraphrase, or a summary of what the original author has written.
- How do I not plagiarize? The very best method of writing that avoids plagiarism is this: Read the source. THEN close the source. THEN write from memory. Check the source for spelling and dates. Cite the source.

PLNU ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATIONS POLICY
