COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OUTCOMES

This seminar examines the relationship between gender and law from the colonial era to the present, with particular emphasis on the court cases and social/political movements that have shaped and continue to shape the legal relationships between women, men, and the nation. Throughout U.S. history, the struggle for women's rights has challenged and changed the legal system, and has helped to define the meanings of citizenship, gender, and sexuality. The readings for this class will historicize several debates that continue to be significant today. Therefore, the course is organized thematically, rather than chronologically, and the weekly class sessions will focus on students' thoughtful discussion and analysis of the reading material.

This is a seminar-style course, which means that our primary goal is to read and then discuss the reading, so your participation in that will be especially important!

The Final Exam

The Final will be an open-notes, essay exam. It will serve you well to take good notes and do the reading responses thoroughly throughout the semester, so that you're well prepared for the exam.

Reading Responses

The reading responses will involve you answering questions about the reading, noting important quotations, and citing your sources. These serve multiple important functions: to show me you carefully did the reading; to prepare you for our class discussions on Zoom; and to give you really good notes so that you can be very successful on the Final Exam. Incompletes and Late Assignments

Please talk with me as soon as possible if for whatever reason you are having trouble completing your work, so that we can find the best solution. All assignments are to be submitted/turned in by the due date posted on Canvas. If assignments are turned in late, they will be subjected to a 10% penalty per day. Course Content and Discussions

The nature of this subject matter means that we're going to read about and discuss a range of very important and serious themes, including ones involving gender-based violence, slavery, sexual assault, and abortion. As scholars, we will be committed to having a classroom dialogue that is respectful and civil, both inside our classroom and in our interactions with each other outside of class. We will work together to seriously engage in studying and understanding these significant historical and contemporary issues. If anyone feels that any of these topics will be particularly difficult for you to read or talk about, please discuss it with me as soon as possible.

In some courses, a portion of the credit hour content will be delivered **asynchronously** and attendance will be determined by submitting the assignments by the posted due dates. Asynchronous Attendance/Participation Definition
