• Philosophy of Music Education (Signature Assignment)

The creation of a professional quality philosophy of music education will be considered the signature assignment for this course. Students must attain a proficient level (per rubric) on this assignment to receive a passing grade.

• General Secondary Observations*

o It is your responsibility to schedule time to observe a variety of local music programs. A minimum of 10 hours must be documented through the successful submission of observation reports. See "Observation Requirements" for more information.

• Practicum*

o In addition to general observation hours, you will be assigned to a local music program at which you will spend a minimum of 10 hours. Working with your cooperating teacher, you will schedule both observations and at least three miniteaching episodes. See "Practicum Requirements" for more information.

PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions, the faculty member will issue a written warning of de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive the appropriate grade for their work and participation.

In some courses, a portion of the credit hour content will be delivered **asynchronously** and attendance will be determined by submitting the assignments by the posted due dates. Asynchronous Attendance/Participation Definition

A day of attendance in asynchronous content is determined as contributing a substantive note, assignment, discussion, or submission by the posted due date. Failure to meet these standards will result in an absence for that day. Instructors will determine how many asynchronous attendance days are required each week.
