COURSE DESCRIPTION

An introductory course emphasizing four basic skills: aural comprehension, speaking, reading, and writing. Also noted is the cultural and historical background of the areas where the language is spoken. Participation and active use of the language is emphasized in the classroom.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the SPA 101-102 sequence, students will be able to:

1. Speak at the mid to high novice level using basic formulaic and memorized materials within the student's own experience.
2. Recognize basic connected discourse that uses vocabulary and grammar within the student's own experience.
3. Write discrete sentences as well as simple connected paragraphs using memorized vocabulary and grammar structures.
4. Read cultural texts that employ familiar vocabulary and cognates as well as learned grammatical structures.
5. Demonstrate comprehension of basic cultural mores and patterns of living of the target culture(s) studied.

FOUNDATIONAL EXPLORATIONS LEARNING OUTCOMES

Elementary Spanish is one of the components of the General Education program at PLNU, under the category of *Seeking Cultural Perspectives*. By including this course in a common educational experience for undergraduates, the faculty supports the survey of human endeavors from a historical, cultural, linguistic and philosophical perspective, including developing critical appreciation of human expression—both artistic and literary.

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

Attendance and participation

Come to class ready to participate en ESPAÑOL! Participating effectively means coming prepared and ready to class so you can engage in a variety of activities created to practice your communicative skills in Spanish.

In agreement with the PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY: “*Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions, the instructor will issue a written warning of de-enrollment. Quizzes: Every week or week and a half you will have a vocabulary quiz to measure your studying and learning. Quizzes represent **10%** of the overall course grade.

Exams: There will be 8 exams, one for each lesson covered. Exams represent **45%** of the overall course grade.

Cultural Engagement Assignment: Students will be required to complete **five** cultural engagement assignments during the class, such as watching a documentary or a movie, visiting a museum, and attending a lecture. The professor will provide more information. **Cultural Engagement Assignment** represents **20%** of the overall course grade.

Portales Assignments: Online homework represents 10% of the overall course grade.

TalkAbroad Conversation: As part of this class, you will have the opportunity to speak with a native speaker of Spanish for 30 minutes. TalkAbroad Conversation represents **5%** of the overall course grade. / CODE for TalkAbroad Conversation is **Pinta2021-974413**

Final Exam: The final exam will be comprehensive, and it represent **10 %** of the overall course grade.
