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## COURSE DESCRIPTION

Introduction to the role of nutrition in human health with respect to essential nutrients, factors that affect eating habits, nutrition research and social media, and establishing a healthy lifestyle.

4. Use various tools (Dietary Guidelines, Food Labels, DRIs) to assess and create a healthful diet. (1c)

5. Describe the benefits and controversies of food technology. (1a, 1b, 1d)
6. Identify the unique nutrient needs of lifespans (1c, 2a)
7. Define food insecurity and identify the causes and efforts to alleviate. (1a, 1b, 1c, 1d)

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## PLNU ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATIONS POLICY

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## ONLINE ASYNCHRONOUS CLASS ATTENDANCE

Students taking online courses with no specific scheduled meeting times are expected to actively engage throughout each week of the course. Attendance is defined as participating in an academic activity within the online classroom which includes, but is not limited to:

- Engaging in an online discussion
- Submitting an assignment
- Taking an exam
- Participating in online labs
- Initiating contact with faculty member within the learning management system to discuss course content.

**Note: Logging into the course does not qualify as participation and will not be counted as meeting the attendance requirement.**

Students who anticipate being absent for an entire week of a course should contact the instructor in advance for approval and make arrangements to complete the required coursework and/or alternative assignments assigned at the discretion of the instructor. Acceptance of late work is at the discretion of the instructor and does not waive attendance requirements.

Students may be warned if they demonstrate a lack of academic activity. After a warning, students who miss more than one week of academic activity without prior approval and arrangements with the instructor may be de-enrolled or withdrawn from a course. If the date of de-enrollment is past the last date to withdraw from a course, the student will be assigned a letter grade of "F" or "NC." There are no refunds for courses where a de-enrollment was processed after the last date to withdraw from a course.

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## COURSE MODALITY DEFINITIONS

1. **In-Person:** Course meetings are face-to-face with no more than 25% online delivery.
2. **Online:** Coursework is completed 100% online and asynchronously.
3. **Online Synchronous:** Coursework is completed 100% online with required weekly online class meetings.
4. **Hybrid:** Courses that meet face-to-face with required online components.

In some courses, a portion of the credit hour content will be delivered asynchronously, and attendance will be determined by submitting the assignments by the posted due dates
