COURSE DESCRIPTION

ATR6015

This course aims to provide you with in-depth study and eventual mastery of the knowledge and skills you will need as a health professional to apply the appropriate therapeutic modalities and manual therapies based on the recent evidence to treat musculoskeletal pathologies in an athletic population. Students will learn how to select and apply the following therapeutic modalities based on sound judgment and evidence: Thermal Modalities, Electrical Modalities, Manual Therapies, etc.

ATR 6015 Lab

This course is designed to allow students to apply and integrate their didactic knowledge during a laboratory setting. Students will learn to apply all of the therapeutic agents learned in class to patients in clinical settings.

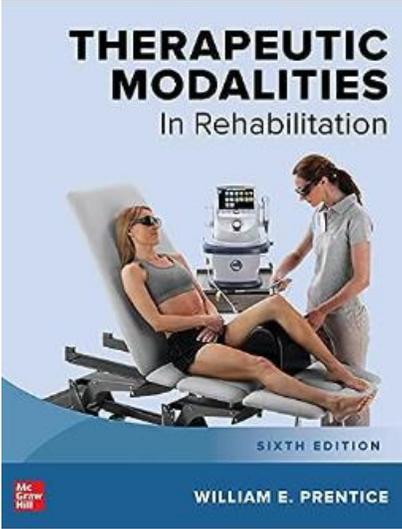

Students must complete the required program hours in the major (program) from Point Loma Nazarene University with a minimum grade of “C” in each course and an overall 2.00 grade point average.

Grading System

Traditional letter grades (A, B, C, D, F) including plus and minus grades are used to indicate the level of scholarship earned for each course. Except for the correction of an error, all traditional letter grades are final at the conclusion of the academic term. Once the degree has been posted on the student's official transcript, no change of grade action is allowed for courses leading to the degree. The grade of C is the lowest grade acceptable for graduate credit.
