COURSE DESCRIPTION

MTH 1053 - Mathematical Analysis for Business and Economics (3 Units)

This course focuses on learning and using basic mathematical tools that are fundamental to business applications. Applications of these tools include: supply and demand, optimization, cost-benefit analysis, equilibrium (systems of equations), interest, and loan amortization.

Prerequisite(s): MTH 1013 or equivalent.

- 2. Students will be able to use mathematics to solve a variety of interest problems.
- 3. Students will develop an ability to use mathematics to solve equilibrium, optimization, and cost-benefit problems

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

- **Homework**: You may work with other people on your homework, but each individual will be responsible for writing up the entire homework assignment and turning it in. The homework is due at the start of class on Thursday.
- Examinations and the Final Examination. Examinations and the Final Examination will include problems and questions over material assigned in the text, readings and handouts, as well as material presented in class. No examination shall be missed without prior consent or a well-documented emergency beyond your control. In that case, the make-up exam will take place at 8:30 AM on the Saturday before final exams (April 27, 2024). A score of zero will be assigned for an examination that is missed without prior consent or a well-documented emergency beyond your control.
- **Final Examination Policy.** Successful completion of this class requires taking the cumulative final examination on its scheduled day. The final examination

schedule is posted on the <u>Class Schedules</u> site. If you find yourself scheduled for three (3) or more final examinations on the same day, you are authorized to contact each professor to arrange a different time for one of those exams. However, unless you have three (3) or more exams on the same day, no requests for alternative final examinations will be granted.

- Late work will not be accepted without prior consent or a well-documented emergency.
- The examination schedule is included in the daily schedule. This instructor does not intend to accept excuses such as poor communication with parents, benefactors, surf team sponsors and/or travel agents.
