Course Description

Undergraduate students who study psychology typically find themselves at a crossroads. They can either immediately enter the workforce, or they can continue their education in graduate school. Psychology majors who choose not to go to graduate school often do quite well in the working world. Many go on to have successful careers in sales, marketing, management, customer service, human resources, ministry, or other human service field. However, graduate school is a strong draw for many students because it is associated with incentives in later stages of one's career (e.g., greater financial stability, quality of life, opportunities for advancement, etc.). Students who go on to graduate school receive specialized training in any of a variety of areas, including counseling, social work, academic or applied research, statistical methods, neuroscience, and many more. They go on to use this training in many diverse and specialized vocations. Unfortunately, psychology students can easily become overwhelmed by the wide variety of career paths open to them. PSY4000 has been designed with a twofold purpose. The first is to survey the history of psychology with the goal of helping students see where the discipline has been so that they can anticipate and capitalize on future trends. The second is to help students wade through the wide variety of career choices they will find themselves facing in the near future. An essential component of this second goal is to prepare



students for the graduate school application process and/or entry into the job market.

From the catalog: "A study of important ideas and debates in the history of psychology as they reappear in contemporary theory and research (e.g., the mind-body problem; nature-nurture). This course also provides a comprehensive review of important theories and findings in psychology in preparation for the GRE Subject Exam. An overview of the graduate school application process is offered.

Prerequisite(s): Psychology Major and PSY 1003."

Course Credit Hour Information

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 2 unit class delivered over 15 weeks. It is anticipated that students will spend a minimum of 37.5 participation hours per credit hour on their coursework. For this course, students will spend an estimated 75 total hours meeting the course learning outcomes.
