COURSE DESCRIPTION

Sociology presents a fundamentally different perspective on our human world than most Americans typically engage with: one that emphasizes our connections and relationships with other people. In this course, you will begin to examine the role that institutions, power, and our own social interpretations play in shaping our lives. We will examine the constraints and advantages that come with belonging to social groups (including those created by race, gender, age, social-economic status, and religion), and we will wrestle with conceptions of social structure, culture, and deviance.

 Students will acquire knowledge of human cultures and the physical and natural world while developing skills and habits of the mind that foster lifelong learning.

 Students will develop a deeper and more informed understanding of others as they negotiate complex professional, environmental and social contexts.
- Serving, In a Context of Christian Faith
 Students will serve locally and/or globally in vocational and social settings.

- Critically discuss major theoretical perspectives, such as conflict theory, structural functionalism, and symbolic interactionism.
- Identify and critique various social structures, particularly those resulting in inequality and injustice.

- Apply service-minded sociological concepts to specific need areas in our communities.

PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions, the faculty member will issue a written warning of de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive an "F" grade.

COURSE MODALITY DEFINITIONS

- 1. In-Person: Course meetings are face-to-face with no more than 25% online delivery.
- 2. Online: Coursework is completed 100% online and asynchronously.
- Online Synchronous: Coursework is completed 100% online with required weekly online class meetings.
- 4. Hybrid: Courses that meet face-to-face with required online components.

In some courses, a portion of the credit hour content will be delivered asynchronously and attendance will be determined by submitting the assignments by the posted due dates. See Academic Policies B in the Undergraduate Academic Catalog.

ASYNCHRONOUS ATTENDANCE/PARTICIPATION DEFINITION

A day of attendance in asynchronous content is determined as contributing a substantive note, assignment, discussion, or submission by the posted due date. Failure to meet these standards will result in an absence for that day. Instructors will determine how many asynchronous attendance days are required each week.
