COURSE DESCRIPTION

A study of the essential theories and elements of the writing process and critical thinking that we can apply when writing for diverse purposes, audiences, and settings. We will research several genres of writing, including those from our professional fields, and compose expository academic papers that explain our findings while integrating and properly documenting multiple sources. Based on this research, we will also write persuasive proposals that address the needs of potential audiences and stakeholders in our chosen career fields.

- 1. **Learning, Informed by our Faith in Christ** | Students will acquire knowledge of human cultures and the physical and natural world while developing skills and habits of the mind that foster lifelong learning.

- 3. **Serving, In a Context of Christian Faith** | Students will serve locally and/or globally in vocational and social settings.

Students will be assessed via effectively synthesizing information in weekly writing activities and an expository paper and via creating effective arguments in weekly writing activities and a persuasive document.
- FELO 2c. "Students will demonstrate an understanding of the complex issues faced by diverse groups in global and/or cross-cultural contexts." Students will be assessed through weekly writing activities in which they must address the specific needs of global and intercultural audiences.

No required textbook. All required readings are available for free through open access.

COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 3-unit class delivered over 8 weeks. It is anticipated that students will spend a minimum of 37.5 participation hours per credit hour on their coursework. For this course, students will spend an estimated 118 total hours meeting the course learning outcomes. The time estimations are provided in the Canvas modules and in the table below.

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

This course uses weighted grades. Assignment categories are weighted as percentages of the final grade as follows:

- **Lessons** (7%) | The course introduction and Modules 1-5 each contain one lesson using Canvas's quiz format. These lessons are designed to help you synthesize the required resources and learn some additional concepts not discussed in the resources.
- **Weekly Activities (55%)** | Each module will contain two formative weekly activities. These activities are designed to help you practice writing and apply the theory to your writing process.
- **Deliverables (32%)** | The two summative assignments of the course, the expository essay and persuasive memo will allow you to demonstrate what you've learned and to apply it to both academic and professional writing.
- **Surveys** (6%) | As we'll see throughout the course, peer review and audience feedback are essential parts of the writing process, not just for students, but also for faculty. Thus, the midterm and final course evaluations are required.

STATE AUTHORIZATION

State authorization is a formal determination by a state that Point Loma Nazarene University is approved to conduct activities regulated by that state. In certain states outside California, Point Loma Nazarene University is not authorized to enroll online (distance education) students. If a student moves to another state after admission to the program and/or enrollment in an online course, continuation within the program and/or course will depend on whether Point Loma Nazarene University is authorized to offer distance education courses in that state. It is the student's responsibility to notify the institution of any change in his or her physical location. LATE ASSIGNMENTS

All assignments are to be submitted by the due dates. There will be a 10% reduction of possible points for **each day** an assignment is late and assignments will **not be** accepted for credit four days after the due date. If missing assignments result in the failure to meet learning outcomes, you may receive a letter grade reduction on the final grade in addition to the loss of points for missing work. Assignments will be considered late if posted after the due date and time using Pacific Standard Time. No assignments will be accepted after midnight on Sunday night, the last day of class.

Exceptions for extenuating circumstances must be pre-approved by the instructor and the program director.

PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. Therefore, regular attendance and participation in each course are minimal requirements.

Online Asynchronous Class Attendance

Students taking online courses with no specific scheduled meeting times are expected to actively engage throughout each week of the course. Attendance is defined as participating in an academic activity within the online classroom which includes, but is not limited to:

- Engaging in an online discussion
- Submitting an assignment
- Taking an exam
- Participating in online labs
- Initiating contact with faculty member within the learning management system to discuss course content.

Note: Logging into the course does not qualify as participation and will not be counted as meeting the attendance requirement.

Students who anticipate being absent for an entire week of a course should contact the instructor in advance for approval and make arrangements to complete the required coursework and/or alternative assignments assigned at

the discretion of the instructor. Acceptance of late work is at the discretion of the instructor and does not waive attendance requirements.

Students may be warned if they demonstrate a lack of academic activity. After a warning, students who miss more than one week of academic activity without prior approval and arrangements with the instructor may be deenrolled or withdrawn from a course. If the date of de-enrollment is past the last date to withdraw from a course, the student will be assigned a letter grade of "F" or "NC." There are no refunds for courses where a de-enrollment was processed after the last date to withdraw from a course.

Course Modality Definitions

- 1. **In-Person:** Course meetings are face-to-face with no more than 25% online delivery.
- 2. **Online:** Coursework is completed 100% online and asynchronously.
- 3. **Online Synchronous:** Coursework is completed 100% online with required weekly online class meetings.
- 4. **Hybrid:** Courses that meet face-to-face with required online components.

In some courses, a portion of the credit hour content will be delivered asynchronously, and attendance will be determined by submitting the assignments by the posted due dates
