COURSE DESCRIPTION

Catalog Description: A survey of the human communication process. Emphasis is placed on intrapersonal, interpersonal, and public communication. Particular attention is paid to the preparation and presentation of speeches.

and more: This course is designed to provide you with the skills needed for effective public speaking and communication in multiple contexts. These skills include preparing and organizing a speech, developing speech content, and presenting a speech. In addition to the public speaking component of this course, emphasis will also be placed on intrapersonal communication (communication with the self) and interpersonal communication (communication with others). We will study topics such as nonverbal communication, listening, interviewing, working in groups, and conflict resolution.

- Be challenged to interact competently in dyadic, and small group experiences

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COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 3 unit class delivered over 16 weeks. It is anticipated that students will spend a minimum of 37.5 participation hours per credit hour on their coursework. For this course, students will spend an estimated 112.5 total hours meeting the course learning outcomes. The time estimations are provided in the Canvas modules.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Speeches: There are two major speaking assignments required for this course: an Informative Speech, and a Persuasive Speech. Speech assignments will also require an outline, notecards, and peer feedback.

Note: You must complete both major speeches (Informative and Persuasive) in order to pass the class, regardless of point totals.

Mini-Speeches: There will be several “mini-speeches” in this course (ie: self-introduction, "My Favorite Ted Talk" etc). These speeches focus on practice and preparation. You will receive participation points for thoughtful preparation and delivery of each mini-speech.

StoryCorps Interview/Paper: You will interview an acquaintance or loved one using the free StoryCorps app and upload your interview to the StoryCorps online platform (America’s oral history project). Once uploaded, your interview will be added to an archive at the American Folklife Center at the United States Library of Congress. At the end of the semester, you will turn in a reflective essay that chronicles: a review of other interviews on the StoryCorps website, your own interview questions, and a complete description of your interview experience. Quizzes, Discussion Posts, Collaborations, Participation, etc: Throughout the semester there will be interactive Canvas lessons, discussion posts, and other assignments (individual and collaborative with peers) that will be due each week. The point values for these assignments may vary but will be clearly designated on the assignment. You will also receive participation points for your attendance and contributions during class sessions.

NOTE: There may be adjustments made to the point values/totals listed above. Each assignment will be clearly marked with the point value when assigned on Canvas.

Student grades and feedback will be posted in the Canvas grade book promptly after each assignment has been graded. I aim for a 2-5 day turnaround on assignment grading. It is important to read the comments and annotated feedback to improve your work and stay on track with assignments that build in a cumulative fashion.

Rounding: Typically, grades follow the scale below and are not rounded up. Rounding of grades is only done in rare circumstances when the percentage point after the decimal is extremely close to the next grade and the student has demonstrated exemplary participation in the course. Any possible changes are made at the instructor's discretion; please do not request that your grade be rounded up.

SUPPORT

I am committed to helping every student attain their best possible education.

I AM HERE TO HELP! Please do not hesitate to ask questions, or schedule a Zoom office hours appointment. I am also happy to provide support and feedback on assignments before they are turned in or presented. If you have any particular needs or concerns that would be helpful for me to be aware of, please do let me know.

PARTICIPATION

Participation is a BIG DEAL in this class! Because the class is 3 hours and 40 minutes, I teach it in a flipped format. That means you do reading or watch videos, etc, to prepare for the topics we'll cover in class, and during class, we apply those concepts. Because participation is important, you can earn up to 8 points per class session. To earn full points for class participation, you should come to class prepared (reading and other pre-class

assignments complete), and you should participate in class discussions and learning activities. I will use Poll Everywhere to test your knowledge of the reading assignment topics. Please bring a laptop or phone to class so you can respond to the Poll Everywhere questions. Since arriving late to class is distracting to your classmates (and to your professor), you are expected to arrive on time. If you are late you will receive a reduction of your participation points for that class period. If you miss class you will miss your opportunity to earn participation points for that class session. Missing more than 30 minutes of class will count as an absence.

CONSIDERATIONS FOR COVID-19

2. If I (or a member of my household) are in isolation, our class may need to meet remotely for that time. Assignments are to be submitted to Canvas by midnight on the day they are due. There will be a few assignments you submit during class and they will count toward your participation grade for that day. Late assignments will impact your grade. A late assignment will be marked down one letter grade each day it is late. In the event of a personal emergency with advance communication and at my discretion, make-up work *may* be accepted. Incompletes will only be assigned in extremely unusual circumstances.

I will frequently use Canvas Announcements or email to communicate with you and I do my best to respond to your emails as promptly as possible. Generally, will respond to emails Monday-Friday. If you send me an email over the weekend or a holiday, I may not respond until the following school day.

COM 1000 ORIGINAL WORK: All work that you complete for COM 1000 must be originally created by you, just for this class. You may not turn in work for this class that is the same or similar to work that you completed for another current or previous class, without consulting with me first. In some cases, you may also be required to consult with the professor of the other course as well. For example, if you wish to deliver a speech on the same topic that you are writing a research paper on for your Literature class, you must

consult with me as well as your Literature professor to ensure that new/additional work is being completed to satisfy the assignment requirements.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI) POLICY

You are allowed to use Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools (e.g, ChatGPT, iA Writer, Grammarly Go, Botowski, etc.) in this course. Any work that utilizes AI-based tools must be clearly identified as such, including the specific tool(s) used. For example, if you use ChatGPT, you must cite ChatGPT including the version number, year, month and day of the query and the statement “Generated using OpenAI. <https://chat.openai.com/Links to an external site.>”

PLNU ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATIONS POLICY
