COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is the study of the development of the child as influenced by the family, school, and community. Emphasis is placed on analyzing the social influences of family systems, child care, schools, divorce, poverty, peer groups, mass media, diverse cultures and community services on children's development. Visitation of centers and programs for children and adolescents required.

PROGRAM GOAL

The Bachelor of Arts degree program in Child and Adolescent Development (BA-CDV) is to provide working adult students the opportunity to complete a quality college degree via a schedule and format especially designed to meet their unique needs. This curriculum will help support student development toward a personal commitment to improving 1) the lives of individuals and families in their professional endeavors, 2) the lives of community members, and 3) their personal family life.

Students will acquire knowledge of human cultures and the physical and natural world while developing skills and habits of the mind that foster lifelong learning.

3. Serving, In a Context of Christian Faith

Students will serve locally and/or globally in vocational and social settings.

- 4. Assess research of theoretical and appropriate practical elements of parenting to facilitate discussions for a healthy environment for children and adolescents. (ILO-2)
- 5. Evaluate the effects of society and culture upon the family microsystems, family types and the subsequent macrosystems with which they co-exist. (ILO 2)
- 6. Identify career paths and professional areas of service within the child and adolescent profession. (ILO 3)

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES (CLO)

The following student learning outcomes will be achieved by this course:

- 1. Describe the process of how children are socialized, and analyze the role of school, child care, peers, community, media and family systems as socializing agents.
- 2. Demonstrate understanding of factors in the environment, community and family which may either positively contribute to or limit the developmental progress of a child.
- 3. Develop an awareness of, discuss and evaluate the social resources available to children and families, and identify the related career options in child and adolescent development.
- 4. Identify, analyze and evaluate scientific research designed to understand children and their families.
- 5. Examine and analyze myths, biases and stereotypes that impact the development of children and adolescents, with emphasis on the roles of media and culture as agents of socialization in forming and perpetuating those possible myths, biases and stereotypes.

CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION

NOTE: Students are responsible to have the required textbooks prior to the first day of class. Students are also encouraged to begin reading the books in preparation for the class as soon as possible.

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

Your grades will be posted in the Canvas Grades area no later than Thursday of each week beginning in Week Two of this course. It is important to read the comments posted in the Grades area as these comments are intended to help you improve your work. Final grades will be posted no later than ten days after the course concludes. Multiple measures of evaluation are used in the course, allowing students opportunities to demonstrate their learning in more than one way, and giving consideration to individual learning styles. Course components that will be evaluated include:

Attendance and Participation

Participation in discussion board forums online and in class is intended to promote collaboration between participants. These conversations will be based primarily on related assigned readings or content in the course. As a guideline, plan to contribute during active discussions both in class and online. A substantive post contains material related to the topic, application to your teaching practice, and/or extends learning in a meaningful way. Attendance points are earned by being on time to class and staying until the end of class. **Attendance and Participation represent 20% of the overall course grade.**

Assignments

Assignments and additional activities throughout the course and in the face-to-face sessions are assigned. Attendance is also taken for the face-to-face class sessions. Written assignments must reflect college-level writing and critical thinking. Assignments represent 35% of the overall course grade.

Quizzes

Reading quizzes are assigned to ascertain students are completing the required reading prior to the face-to-face sessions. Students must complete the reading prior to attempting the quizzes as they have only one attempt to complete the quiz, all are timed and are not available after the due date. **Quizzes represent 10% of the overall course grade.**

Final Project Assignments

The final assignments for this course serve as an opportunity for you to demonstrate your knowledge of the course learning outcomes. The course projects include the Article Critique, Agency Visit Proposal, Report, the Interview and Report and the Final Essay. The Final Projects represent 35% of the overall course grade. Failure to complete any of these assignments will result in a failing grade in the course regardless of overall score from other assignment submissions.
