COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides an in-depth study of advanced accounting concepts. Topics include goodwill, business combinations including consolidated financial statements for wholly and partially owned subsidiaries, derivatives and hedge accounting, foreign currency transactions and translation, and partnership accounting.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES (CLO)

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Exhibit an understanding of advanced accounting topics, including business combinations, consolidated financial statements, foreign currency transactions, and partnerships (PLO M1).
2. Prepare and analyze consolidated financial statements (PLO M1, M2 & M4).
3. Translate a set of consolidated financial statements from foreign currency to US Dollars (PLO M1 & M4).
4. Prepare calculations and journal entries related to partnerships (PLO M1 & M2).
5. Analyze accounting decisions based upon ethical values (PLO M2 & M4).

Midterms & Final Exam: The exams may include multiple-choice or problems based on text material, class discussions, and homework assignments. The final exam will be comprehensive. No makeup exams will be given without prior permission. Students should bring standard calculators, pencils, and an eraser to all exams.

Homework: Homework assignments are worth 20 points each and consist of questions and problems from the end of each chapter. Submit only your own original work for homework. Homework will be completed and submitted through McGraw Hill's Connect website. Assignments will receive a 10%

increase in grade when transferred to Canvas. Late homework assignments will receive 50% credit, but no homework will be accepted after the exam on the chapter material.

Reading Questions: Rather than taking a quiz before we discuss each chapter in class, you will be given a set of reading questions to respond to and submit via file upload in Canvas for each chapter. Each chapter's reading questions will be worth 5 points. The objective is to encourage you to read the chapters before they are discussed in class as well as to help build out your notes for each chapter. The questions have been chosen intentionally to help you think through the major issues in each chapter and to help you prepare for the class discussion that will occur in the chapter.

Unit Assignments: At the end of each unit, you will be assigned either a data analysis, research, or writing assignment that will require you to use tools available to you to either answer a research question, look into and analyze an aspect of a company's financial statement or communicate research in written form. The goal of these unit assignments is to help you move beyond the problems worked and actually apply that material to a "real-world" scenario. This will also give you a glimpse into one aspect of an accountant in any industry.

Accounting Ethics Case: You will complete a case study that focuses on how accounting ethics intersects with the material in advanced accounting and the importance of ethics in accounting. More details will be provided on Canvas and in class.

Mock CPA Exam: Since many of you will be taking the CPA exam after graduation, a mock CPA exam with a combination of multiple-choice questions and task-based simulations will be given covering financial accounting topics learned in advanced accounting. This is designed to give you a feel for both the level of studying it takes to pass the exam as well as the types of questions given on the exam.

Class Participation & Attendance: I expect you to come to class prepared to answer questions and participate in group activities and other in-class assignments. **Attendance at all class sessions is mandatory. Be on time for class.** Punctuality is an important attribute in any successful business endeavor. Students who have an unexcused absence will not receive any points for that day. Students who are late for class will automatically lose half the available points for that day. Students may be excused from class for inappropriate computer/cell phone usage, and the class will be counted as an unexcused absence for grading purposes.

Graduation Requirements for the MSA (ACC5000 and ACC6000 level courses): Achievement of a cumulative GPA of 3.000 or higher. A student may earn a maximum of six (6) units of "C" grades in the
