#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course explores how leaders can use data to inform the decision-making process. Topics include identifying the right information, eliminating bias, understanding predictive analytics, data visualization, communicating uncertainty and addressing challenges to your data. An emphasis is placed on basic methods of gathering, analyzing and communicating data.

#### PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance at all **synchronous** class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. Therefore, regular attendance and participation in each course are minimal

requirements. If the student is absent from more than 10 percent of class sessions (virtual or face-to-face), the faculty member can file a written report which may result in de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive an "F" grade.
