COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course reflects PLNU's commitment, as a Christian university of the liberal arts and professions, to nurture an appreciation for Scripture as the basis for creative personal faith and human life in the modern world. It is designed to foster knowledge and understanding of the literature and history of the Bible and to integrate faith, learning, and living from a Wesleyan perspective.

INSTITUTIONAL LEARNING OUTCOMES

1. Learning, Informed by our Faith in Christ

Students will acquire knowledge of human cultures and the physical and natural world while developing skills and habits of the mind that foster lifelong learning.

2. Growing, In a Christ-Centered Faith Community

Students will develop a deeper and more informed understanding of others as they negotiate complex professional, environmental and social contexts.

3. Serving, In a Context of Christian Faith

Students will serve locally and/or globally in vocational and social settings.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

The following student learning outcomes will be met in this course:

1. To recognize the central role of Jesus, as the fulfillment of the Old Testament hope for the future, and as the focus of the faith of the New Testament Church.
2. To outline the general contents of the Bible, including major events of biblical history and flow of the biblical narrative.
3. To identify, summarize and discuss major themes and virtues of the Bible and their continuing relevance for Christian faith and life.
4. To reflect on and articulate how certain key biblical concepts influence contemporary practice in students' social environments including family, work, relationships and global settings.
5. To undertake an in depth study of the Book of Philippians, identifying and reflecting in writing upon its major themes and the central role of Jesus in believers' lives and in the church.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Multiple measures of evaluation are used in the course allowing students opportunities to demonstrate learning in more than one way, and giving consideration to individual learning styles. Course components that will be evaluated include the following:

1. **Academic Honesty Verification Statement:** During the first week of class, you will be asked to submit an Academic Honesty Verification statement. Submitting the Statement is a requirement of this course.
2. **Assignments** are located in each week throughout the course. These assignments will be fundamental to the learning process and are meant to impact your thinking about biblical concepts and how they apply to your personal life.
3. **Video Assignments** are located in each week throughout the course. These assignments will be

fundamental to the learning process and are meant to impact your thinking about biblical concepts.

4. **Online Discussions** Participation in discussion board forums is intended to promote collaboration between participants and increase understanding of biblical concepts. These online conversations will be based primarily on related assigned readings, videos, and each student's individual experience. As a guideline, plan to contribute at least two substantive posts per week during active discussions. A substantive post contains material related to the topic, and/or extends learning in a meaningful way. It is expected that you read all posts in each discussion board group forum.
5. **Exploratory Assignments** will involve experiences in different venues that will enhance the learning process for the student.
6. **Summary Projects, including the Final Project**, occur at the end of the course as a summative assessment of the culmination of each week's learning and contributions.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS

All assignments are to be submitted by the due dates. There will be a 10% reduction of possible points for **each day** an assignment is late and assignments will **not be** accepted for credit four days after the due date. If missing assignments result in the failure to meet learning outcomes, students may receive a letter grade reduction on the final grade in addition to the loss of points for missing work. Assignments will be considered late if posted after the due date and time using Pacific Standard Time. No assignments will be accepted after midnight on Sunday night, the last day of class.

PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Students taking online courses with no specific scheduled meeting times are expected to actively engage throughout each week of the course. Attendance is defined as participating in an academic activity within the online classroom which includes, but is not limited to:

- Engaging in an online discussion

- Submitting an assignment

- Taking an exam

- Participating in online labs

- Initiating contact with faculty member within the learning management system to discuss course content

Note: Logging into the course does not qualify as participation and will not be counted as meeting the attendance requirement.

Students who anticipate being absent for an entire week of a course should contact the instructor in advance for approval and make arrangements to complete the required coursework and/or alternative assignments assigned at the discretion of the instructor. Acceptance of late work is at the discretion of the instructor and does not waive attendance requirements.

Students may be warned if a student demonstrates a lack of academic activity. After a warning, students who miss more than one week of academic activity without prior approval and arrangements with the instructor may be disenrolled or withdrawn from the course. If the date of de-enrollment is past the last date to withdraw from a course, the student will be assigned a letter grade of "F" or "NC."
