# **Course Description**

Combines principles of journalistic writing and reporting with field production techniques of television & radio news. Students learn the basic concepts of reporting and producing a variety of television & radio news stories, from simple anchor readers to complex packages.

### **Course Credit Hour Information**

# **Final Examination Policy**

Successful completion of this class requires taking the final examination on its scheduled day. # **Incompletes and Late Assignments**

All assignments are to be submitted/turned in by the beginning of the class session when they are due.

Assignments submitted after the deadline will receive a **10% deduction for each calendar day late,** up to a **maximum penalty of 50%.** Incompletes will only be assigned in extremely unusual circumstances.

**Example:** An assignment submitted 1 day late will lose 10%, 3 days late 30%, and 5 or more days late will lose 50% (maximum).

This means you can still receive credit for your work even if it's significantly late, but the highest deduction applied will not exceed 50% of the assignment grade, except for in an unusual circumstance.

Canvas may automatically mark the late assignment as zero. **Please do not be alarmed if this happens.** <u>I</u> will go through each assignment later and change the grade to reflect the 50% maximum penalty.

I understand that life happens, and unexpected situations may arise. Please communicate with me as early as possible if you anticipate not being able to turn in the assignment on time.

# **Assignments At-A-Glance**

#### Canvas Assignments (130 points):

Throughout the semester, you'll complete several assignments via Canvas that are designed to expose you to different styles and formats of TV and radio news. These assignments may include script analysis, clip breakdowns, and short writing tasks. Most students entering this course haven't had extensive exposure to broadcast news forms—these assignments are meant to introduce you to visual storytelling, audio pacing, and the structural elements of both TV and radio news. These will be assessed for a total of 13% of your final grade.

### **Chapter Reading Responses (150 points):**

You will be assigned **15 reading responses (10 points each)** throughout the semester that help build your understanding of broadcast journalism fundamentals. These readings will cover topics such as writing to video, producing for radio and television, and ethical standards in journalism. Your responses should show that you understand the material and can apply it to your own reporting and production work. Reading responses will be assessed for a total of **15% of your final grade**.

### VO/SOT Project (100 points):

This is your first hands-on news production assignment. You'll complete a **VO/SOT project** (Voiceover/Sound-on-Tape) in four stages: pitch, production plan, script and video, and a revision. This assignment will help you understand the basics of broadcast writing, shooting, and editing short news segments. You'll learn how to pair soundbites and video with scripted narration, a key skill in both TV and digital reporting. This project will be assessed for a total of **10% of your final grade**.

#### TV News Packages (320 points):

You will produce **two full-length TV news packages** over the course of the semester. Each package includes the following deliverables: a pitch, a production plan, and the package with a script for tv and web. The packages will be assessed for a total of 32% **of your final grade**. These assignments are the core of the class and will require strong reporting, scriptwriting, interview and camera work, editing, and multimedia storytelling. The web component ensures you're thinking about how your story is told across platforms.

#### Audio Feature (75 points):

In this assignment, you will pitch and produce an **audio-only feature story**, using interviews, narration, and natural sound to tell a compelling story. This includes a short **pitch** and the final **audio feature**. This

is an opportunity to apply your storytelling skills to radio or podcast-style journalism. It will be assessed for a total of **7.5% of your final grade**.

### **Current Events Quizzes (100 points):**

There will be **10 current events quizzes** administered in class throughout the semester, each worth **10 points** and including a bonus question. These quizzes will help you stay informed on local, national, and global news, and strengthen your understanding of what's considered newsworthy. They will be assessed for a total of **10% of your final grade**.

#### Final Newscast Production (50 points):

At the end of the semester, the entire class will collaborate to **produce and shoot a full TV newscast**. This is a team effort and will simulate a real newsroom environment. You'll work together to assign stories, produce scripts, gather footage, and record the final broadcast. Your grade will be based primarily on **participation**, **preparation**, **and contribution to your team**. This project will be assessed for a total of **10% of your final grade**.

**Final Exam (50 points):** You will take a final exam at the end of the semester composed of questions from your reading assignments. It will be assessed for a total of **10% of your final grade.**
