Course Description

This course is designed as an introduction to psychopathology and the study of abnormal psychology. Topics of exploration include the assessment, classification, etiology, and treatment of the major psychological disorders.

Catalog Description

Study of etiology, assessment, diagnosis, and treatment of various forms of abnormal behavior from various psychological perspectives.

Program and Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. Understand the history behind mental health disorders and western diagnostic classification systems.
- 2. Examine the core symptoms and features of psychological disorders.
- 3. Understand the competing theories attempting to explain how psychological disorders develop.
- 4. Identify the various empirically supported therapeutic treatments for psychological disorders.
- 5. Critically evaluate the value of diagnosing mental illnesses when taking into consideration the

benefits, limitations, critiques, and implications of diagnostic classification.

6. Explore how aspects of human diversity may affect the expression of psychopathology.

Course Credit Hour Information

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 3-unit class delivered over 15 weeks. For this course, students will spend an estimated 112.5 total hours meeting the course learning outcomes.
