Outcome Measure:


To assess student engagement and improve chapel offerings, a survey was distributed to traditional undergraduate students during the spring semester. Of the approximately 2,700 students enrolled, 1,438 responded, over half of this student population. The survey was completely anonymous and evaluated various aspects of chapel, including the quality and impact of preaching and teaching, student participation in worship, and the integration of two key themes aligned with WASC/WSCUC assessment goals.

Students were also asked to identify spiritual practices they had encountered or participated in during chapel services. Responses included a broad array of practices such as prayer, communal worship through music, Scripture reading, passing the peace, communion, prayer stations, call and response, lectio divina, breath prayer, sabbath observance, and moments of silence and reflection. Many students cited more than one practice, indicating a wide engagement with various expressions of worship. Practices such as lectio divina are emphasized particularly in Friday services, while communion is celebrated monthly and the passing of the peace is a consistent feature of Thursday evening gatherings.

Criteria for Success: 75% of students will be able to identify a spiritual practice within the chapel setting.

Conclusions Drawn from Data:

Many students cited more than one practice, indicating a wide engagement with various expressions of worship. Practices such as lectio divina are emphasized particularly in Friday services, while communion is celebrated monthly and the passing of the peace is a consistent feature of Thursday evening gatherings.

Looking ahead, the Chapel programming will continue to hold both its commitment to diverse perspectives and scripturally faithful preaching. Our desire is to continue engage our community in a variety of creative and meaningful moments in corporate worship and compelling preaching, trusting that the Spirit will use these moments to teach and transform the lives of the students we serve.

Changes to be Made Based on Data:

The practice of personal testimonies of student, staff, and faculty will also be more explicitly framed as a spiritual practice, given its frequent inclusion in chapel services. PLNU's chapel programming continues to be deeply rooted in its Wesleyan-Holiness heritage and its commitment to spiritual and educational development. Through intentional planning, assessment, and inclusion, chapel remains a vital space where students engage with faith, community, and service in meaningful and transformative ways.


Outcome Measure:

Of the approximately 2,700 students enrolled, 1,438 responded, over half of this student population. The survey was completely anonymous and evaluated various aspects of chapel, including the quality and impact of preaching and teaching, student participation in worship, and the integration of two key themes aligned with WASC/WSCUC assessment goals. One section of the survey addressed the extent to which students felt chapel speakers expanded their understanding and commitment to engaging diverse perspectives.

Criteria for Success: 75% of students strongly agree and agree that chapel broadened their understanding and commitment to engaging diverse perspectives.
