Course Description

This course is the study of physical, social, emotional, and intellectual growth in the development of the child, from prenatal months to adolescent years. Practical application is developed through field experience, journaling, and observations.

Attendance & Participation	Participation in discussion board forums online and in class is intended to promote collaboration between participants. These conversations will be based primarily on related assigned readings or content in the course. As a guideline, plan to contribute during active discussions both in class and online. A substantive post contains material related to the topic, application to your teaching practice, and/or extends learning in a meaningful way. Attendance points are earned by being on time to class and staying until the end of class.	30%
Observations & Fieldwork	Observations and fieldwork are required in this course. These opportunities will allow students to critically reflect on their understanding of child development, complete observations in the field, and gain experience in scaffolding activities in each domain of development.	25%

Signature Assignment	The final assignment for this course is a theoretical framework paper that will allow you to demonstrate and apply your understanding of child and adolescent development.	35%

Assignments will be graded as soon after the due date as possible and feedback will be given on your assignments. It is important to read the comments posted in the Grades area and on your document submissions as these comments are intended to help you improve your work. You can expect an email
