COURSE DESCRIPTION

Recognition and initial care of commonly occurring injuries to active people. Objective methods for determining if a person is able to continue to play following injury or if referral to medical care is required.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

In this course, you will learn how to:

1. Delineate the realm of sports medicine and understand its importance within the broader healthcare system.

2. Be conversant in medical terminology as it relates to sports medicine and athletic training.
3. Understand and utilize the components of the orthopedic examination process to identify the cause and signs & symptoms of the most common athletic injuries and illnesses.
4. Identify the methods for preventing, evaluating and treating injuries and illnesses that occur in the active population.

COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 2-unit class delivered over 15 weeks. It is anticipated that students will spend a minimum of 37.5 participation hours per credit hour on their coursework. For this course, students will spend an estimated 75 total hours meeting the course learning outcomes. The time estimations are provided in the Canvas modules.

INCOMPLETES AND LATE ASSIGNMENTS

All assignments must be submitted by the specified due dates in Canvas. Incompletes will be granted only under exceptionally unusual circumstances. Late assignment submissions will be accepted for excused absences only when submitted the updated due date. Other late assignments will be marked down 10% per day late that the assignment is turned in.

QUIZZES

Quizzes will be administered on a near weekly basis per the course schedule. Quizzes are taken by students individually and then again as a small group to facilitate discussion and group based learning. Make up quizzes will only be permitted for excused absences that have been communicated prior to missed quiz. Quizzes as a whole will make up 20% of a student's grade in the course.

IN CLASS PARTICIPATION

Components of in class participation include: attendance through Poll Everywhere questions, engaging with your classmates in group based activities such as group quizzes and case studies and sharing those outcomes or learning points with the class. Students will also have the opportunity to grade their groupmates' participation and preparation periodically throughout the semester to foster accountability and promote transparent teamwork.

SIGNATURE ASSIGNMENTS

There will be an Injury Assessment Outline (IAO) and Article Critique completed for each the lower extremity and upper extremity and will comprise 30% of students' grade.

1. The IAO is designed to:
 - a. Enhance your understanding of the orthopedic examination process.
 - b. Strengthen your ability to recognize the signs and symptoms of common athletic injuries.
 - c. Practice differentiating between potential diagnoses, a skill critical for careers in healthcare, kinesiology, and sports medicine.
2. The Article Critique is designed to:
 - a. Gain exposure to recent advances in the assessment, treatment, and rehabilitation of athletic injuries.
 - b. Practice critical thinking skills by evaluating the strengths, weaknesses, and applicability of scholarly research.
 - c. Develop the ability to synthesize research findings into practical insights that inform evidence-based clinical decisions.

EXAMS

Exams are in class and taken on Honorlock. Refer to the course schedule below regarding dates for each. Exams comprise 40% of students' grade in this course. Exam 1 will cover foundational concepts leading up to body region specific content. Exam 2 will cover content regarding the lower extremities, while Exam 3 will cover content related to the upper extremities, spine and head.

FINAL EXAMINATION POLICY

Successful completion of this class requires taking the final examination on its scheduled day. If you find yourself scheduled for three (3) or more final examinations on the same day, you are authorized to contact each professor to arrange a different time for one of those exams.
