Course Description

This course is the study of developmental stages and strategies of guiding children and adolescents with special needs. A wide variety of childrens' exceptionalities including autism spectrum disorders, giftedness, physical challenges, learning disabilities, and behavior disorders will be covered. This course will examine the role of the adults influencing the child's social, emotional, intellectual, and physical growth. Family system theories and educational methods, environments, and programs are explored as they relate to the special needs child's developmental stages. Observation, field experiences, and visitations to community educational facilities are required.

Program Goal

The goal of the Bachelor of Arts degree program in Child Development (BA-CDV) is to provide students the opportunity to complete a quality college degree via a schedule and format specially designed to meet their unique needs. This curriculum will help support student development toward a personal commitment to improving 1) the lives of individuals and families in their professional endeavors, 2) the lives of community members, and 3) their personal family life.

Assessment and Grading

Graded Components

Quizzes and Discussions: Each week, students will complete quizzes related to the week's readings and participate in online discussions with classmates. These discussions are in addition to the interactive dialogue that occurs in the traditional classroom setting. **Quizzes represent 10% of the overall course grade. Discussions represent 15% of the overall course grade.**

Fieldwork: Fieldwork is represented by completing one interview in the field and attending a parent education meeting. These two will be documented and shared with your classmates. **Fieldwork represents 15% of the overall course grade.**

Assignments: In addition to a grade for attendance, there are several written assignments due in this course. These assignments must reflect college-level writing and critical thinking and will include group projects. **Assignments represent 25% of the overall course grade.**

Final Project: The research paper and a parent and family resource manual and training project for this course serve as an opportunity for you to demonstrate your knowledge of the course learning outcomes. The research project will be required to address a series of questions using peer-reviewed journals. **The Final Project represents 30% of the overall course grade. Failure to complete any of these assignments will result in a failing grade in the course, regardless of the overall score from other assignment submissions.**
