4. Students will collaborate effectively in teams.
5. Students will be able to identify, locate, evaluate, and effectively and responsibly use and cite information for the task at hand.
6. Students will be able to gather relevant information, examine information and form a conclusion based on that information.
7. Students will be able to understand and create arguments supported by quantitative evidence, and they can clearly communicate those arguments in a variety of formats.

Assessment and Grading

Grades will be based on the following:

- **Skills presentation:** This is a team grade as skills presentations will be made in teams of 2-3. However, if one person is missing or does not speak, that individual will receive a zero. The presentation should cover material requested by the professor. The presentation is expected to be 15-20 minutes and should include a 5-minute exercise for the class to complete.
- **Ethics presentation:** Our work is not just about what we do, but how we do it, keeping in mind how it will affect society. Each student should have thoroughly read and contemplated the

paper and prepared a brief synopsis along with 3-4 discussion questions for class consideration based on that paper.

- **Mid-semester presentation:** This is a team grade as mid-semester presentations will be made in teams of 2-3. However, if one person is missing or does not speak, that individual will receive a zero. Progress on the project will be judged by your presentation, and failure to show adequate progress on your project can result in large deductions.
- **Weekly progress reports:** A recounting of what you, as an individual, completed towards the project. Points can be regained in this category if a dramatic contribution was made the week after points were missed.
- **Poster:** Your poster will be presented to a wide audience. This is a team grade as posters are made and presented in teams of 2-3. However, if one person does not participate, that individual will receive a zero.
- **Elevator speech:** The elevator speech shows that an individual is familiar enough with the project to present an interesting summary in 30-60 seconds. This is an individual grade and will be developed in anticipation of the poster presentation.
- **Peer evaluations:** These are expected to be honest assessments of the contribution of your team members. Points will be deducted from the evaluation that you complete if the professor believes that the evaluation is not a true representation of reality (in other words, that you are just trying to be nice to a friend).
- **Project paper:** The project paper is an individual grade. It will be based on the individual sections being turned in and revised as requested. Credit is not given if the sections are not turned in on time. Points may also be deducted if you are absent on a day when peer reviews take place or if the final quality of the paper is poor.
- **Team assignments:** Team assignments may include, but are not limited to, development of the problem statement and management plans, client meetings, client approvals, poster draft, and reflections.
- **Late work will not be accepted.** Assignments that are submitted late will be recorded with a score of zero. No presentation shall be missed without a well-documented emergency beyond your control. A score of zero will be assigned for a presentation that is missed without a well-documented emergency beyond your control.
