General Education Mission

PLNU provides a foundational course of study in the liberal arts informed by the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Course Description

A study of foods and food practices from cultures around the world. Topics include the history and present-day use of food ingredients in ethnic cuisines and their nutritional implications, religion and food choices, cultural health beliefs, and culinary preparations.

1. Compare and contrast how food choices and preparation techniques are affected by culture, including religious practices and health beliefs (GELO 1a, 1d, 2c)
2. Plan and prepare a broad spectrum of foods using a variety of preparation techniques and equipment, under a range of cultural food patterns (GELO 2a, 2c)
3. Explain and apply fundamental principles of food preparation and their scientific bases (GELO 1a, 1d)

4. Evaluate products for their sensory qualities and to ascertain achievement of quality standards (GELO 1a, 1d)
 5. Identify and demonstrate safe food handling practices and basic principles of food selection and purchasing (GELO 1d, 2a)

PLNU Attendance and Participation Policy

Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. Therefore, regular attendance and participation in each course are minimal requirements.

If the student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions, the faculty member will issue a written warning of de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university withdrawal date or, after that date, receive an “F” grade.

Synchronous Attendance/Participation Definition

For synchronous courses that have specific scheduled meeting times (including in-person, hybrid, and synchronous online courses), absences are counted from the first official meeting of the class regardless of the date of the student's enrollment. Online Asynchronous Attendance/Participation Definition

Students taking online courses with no specific scheduled meeting times are expected to actively engage throughout each week of the course. Attendance is defined as participating in an academic activity within the online classroom, which includes, but is not limited to:

- Engaging in an online discussion
- Submitting an assignment
- Taking an exam
- Participating in online labs
- Initiating contact with faculty members within the learning management system to discuss course content

Note: Logging into the course does not qualify as participation and will not be counted as meeting the attendance requirement.

Course Modality Definitions

1. Online Courses: These are courses with class meetings where all instruction and interaction are fully online.
 1. Synchronous Courses: At least one class meeting takes place at a designated time.
 2. Asynchronous Courses: All class meetings are asynchronous.
2. Hybrid Courses: These are courses with class meetings that take place both in the classroom and online synchronously and/or asynchronously.

3. In-Person Courses: These are courses that meet in person with the instructor and students in a physical classroom setting. With approval by the area dean, this may include up to 25% of qualified class interactions through a Learning Management System (such as Canvas).
