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# ART326 PHOTOGRAPHY: CONTEMPORARY IMAGES

### COURSE DESCRIPTION

Art 326 Photography: Contemporary Images is an advanced level course in photography designed to explore various strategies used to create contemporary photography based artwork. The goals of the course are to continue the students technical knowledge of the photographic process as well and introduce new and alternative processes, examine the relationship between photography and other art forms and to create an environment in which the student can explore their own artistic ideas.

Student are expected to gain technical knowledge, as well as develop their own conceptual views on photography and its relationship to art making as a whole. This is to be accomplished through the creation of original artwork, class critiques and discussions, readings, written assignments, and class field trips.

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## LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students will...

Analyze the technical and aesthetic differences between traditional and digital photographic processes, and experiment with alternative processes.

Articulate insights and issues related to contemporary photography

Explore several ways that photographic imagery can be presented and compare how each method changes the overall experience of the viewer

Plan and execute their own photo shoots, producing images that demonstrate a clear vision and technical proficiency

Create a cohesive body of work in the form of a portfolio, sample exhibition, or photography book.

## COURSE REQUIREMENTS

### Weekly Studio Practice

Each week the students will be responsible for shooting the equivalent of one roll of film per week (24-36 shots). These images will serve as a means for discussing the students progress and developing direction for future work.

### Three Projects

Student will complete three sculpture related projects this semester. Each of these projects will deal with a different approach to creating contemporary art. Time will be given to explore materials, techniques, themes, create “experiments” and develop ideas. In addition to representing your best artistic efforts, projects must be complete and exhibition ready by the date of your assigned critique in order to receive full points.

### Readings & Writings

Several class related readings will be assigned this the semester. Students will be responsible to complete the material on time, write a short response to its content, and be prepared for in class discussions. These will be used to broaden ideas about photography and consider new applications for its use as an art making tool.

### Critiques

There will be three in class critiques held during the semesters. These critiques offer the opportunity for a dialogue of constructive criticism that helps the artist to find the strengths and weaknesses of her work. Each student is expected to contribute to this discussion. In fact your participation grade is based in part on your willingness to join in during the critique. If you are absent from a critique or your images are not “critique ready” your work is considered late, and the highest grade you can receive for that project is a “C”. There is no way of making up the points lost for missing a critique.

In preparation for each critique the student will be asked to create an artist statement about their work.

## FINAL GRADE BREAKDOWN

Grades will be based on a total number of points accumulated during the semester, with a possible total of (approximately) 600 pts.

While the grading of art is necessarily subjective, I try to approach each student's work as fairly and objectively as possible, taking in to account each of the student's circumstances & abilities. Individual work will be graded on the following components

- Meets Project Objectives
- Effort
- Composition
- Craftsmanship/Technical
- Concept/Creativity

A more specific breakdown of how individual projects are to be evaluated will be provided in a handout upon the introduction of each project.

Assignments turned in late receive an automatic one letter grade deduction.

For each additional day the assignment is late an additional letter grade will be deducted.

## ATTENDANCE
