COURSE DESCRIPTION

A practical introduction to media technology resources for music ministry. The course includes training in the use of audio and visual media such as video, lighting, sound reinforcement, and presentation software.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the completion of this course students will

- Demonstrate the skills and knowledge necessary to function effectively in a multimedia worship environment. The specific multimedia applications that will be covered in class will include the following:
 - a. **Sound Reinforcement.** The student will understand and effectively utilize the various components of a standard live sound reinforcement system.
 - b. **Presentation Software.** The student will understand and effectively utilize a common presentation software application.
 - c. **Video Editing.** The student will develop basic proficiency in and understanding of video editing and rendering.
 - d. **Lighting.** The student will understand basic tools and concepts of lighting for both live performance and video recording.
- Demonstrate skills and terminology necessary to communicate clearly and effectively with multimedia professionals and volunteers within a church environment.

POSITION OF COURSE IN COLLEGE CURRICULUM: : Multimedia for Worship Ministry is a required course for students who are pursuing a Bachelor of Arts in Music with a Concentration in Music and Ministry

COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 2 unit class delivered over the duration of the spring semester. REQUIRED TEXTS AND RECOMMENDED STUDY RESOURCES

METHODS USED IN THE COURSE:

- Prepare oral and written assignments.
- Prepare multimedia projects.
- Demonstrate skills and knowledge via written exams.

EVALUATION: Students will be evaluated on their exams, various projects, and attendance. All students are expected to meet the standards for this course as set by the instructor. However, students with learning disabilities who may need accommodations should discuss options with the instructor during the first two weeks of class and provide approved documentation and verification of need. The Academic Support Center is available to students for a variety of tutorial needs.

Final grade will be determined by the following:

1. 10% for quizzes

3. 25% for written assignments
4. 50% for projects
5. 10% for final project/final exam
