COURSE DESCRIPTION

“Within the context of Christian origins, an overview of the canonical literature of the New Testament with special attention to its literary history and theological themes.”

This course is one of the components of the General Education Program at PLNU, under the category of “Responding to the Sacred.” By including this course in a common educational experience for undergraduates, the faculty supports the “study of Scripture and Christian heritage as foundational in the pursuit of knowledge and the development of personal values.”

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students will be able to:

- 1) Identify the historical contexts of the New Testament.
- 2) Articulate the unity of the Old Testament and New Testament in its canonical context within the diverse literature of the Christian canon.
- 3) Articulate and appreciate the ways in which the Bible, understood as given by divine inspiration, functions as the church's central norm for Christian discipleship, faith and practice.
- 4) Articulate the basic content of the books of the New Testament and the methods appropriate to the interpretation of those books.

COURSE ASSIGNMENT SCHEDULE

Class Participation: 5 pts

Attendance: You are expected to attend every class session. Your Bible is also expected to attend every class session. Attendance will be taken and school policies enforced.

Reading: Come to class prepared. Read everything that is assigned. Be prepared to discuss the content of the Biblical texts and the secondary reading.

Weekly(ish) Reflection Journal (On Canvas): 10 Points

10 Entries Required over the course of the Semester (one per week maximum)

Answer these questions in 280 characters or less:

What class content/discussion surprised you this week?

What class content/discussion challenged you, personally?

Was there any sort of paradigm shift for you this week? If so, what was it?

Introduce us to a Book/Section of the New Testament (Group Presentation): 15 Points

Groups of 3 or 4 will introduce each book/group of books of the New Testament to the rest of the class. The presentation should include the genre of the text, the details of its authorship, the basic structure (the general story being told/argument being made), the general themes, and the problems/controversies/points of contention. It should also include things like particularly challenging passages, examples of artistic or literary interpretations of the text, or other aspects of the text that the class may find noteworthy, interesting, and/or helpful. Presentations should last 20-25 minutes.

Experiential Learning: 15 pts

Students will make a site visit and interview a leader/organizer to gain a new perspective on issues presented in the New Testament. Students will write an 800-1000 word reflection on this experience, highlighting the ways that what they saw, heard, touched, and smelled will help them better understand the New Testament.

Three Options (choose 1):

“Stigma” Option: Visit and volunteer in a Christian ministry that serves a stigmatized population that might be considered “untouchable”, “stigmatized”, or “taboo,” Examples might be: the unsheltered, LGBTQ+, refugees/immigrants, sex workers, etc... Interview both a leader/organizer and a member of the stigmatized population. Ask about the barriers that stigma creates for people and the significance of crossing those barriers. Ask how the New Testament has influenced their ministry and how the ministry has influenced their interpretation of the New Testament. (Due 9/21)

“Intentional Christian Community” Option: Visit an intentional Christian community that is shaped by the New Testament and interview a resident. Ask about the challenges of living in close community the way that the New Testament has shaped the community, and ask how living in community has shaped their interpretation of the New Testament. (Due 10/19)

“Messianic Synagogue” Option: Visit and interview the Rabbi/leader of a Messianic Jewish Synagogue. Ask about Torah observance in a messianic community, about the relationship between Jews and gentiles in the church today, and how Torah observance and Jew/gentile relationships have been shaped by the New Testament (particularly by Paul’s letters). (Due 11/2)

Text Analysis: 15 pts

Students will select a pericope to analyze in detail using the outline that will be provided. More details will be provided (including text options). (Due 11/30)

Gospel Exam on October 11th: 15 pts

Paul Quiz on October 23rd: 5 pts
