Lit 3052 is a course approved for credit in the General Education program of PLNU. Its content is designed to help students meet General Education Learning Outcome 2b: "Students will understand and appreciate diverse forms of artistic expression." The Learning Outcome will not be measured in this course because it is measured in the required upper division literature courses.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A study of representative works of literature and cultural contexts. In this section, we will be examining the short stories of four American writers.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students will be able to

- 1. Closely read and critically analyze texts in their original languages and/or in translation.
- 2. Recall, identify, and use fundamental concepts of literary study to read and discuss texts
 - a. Standard literary terminology
 - b. Modes/genres of literature
 - c. Elements of literary genres
 - d. Literary periods (dates, writers, characteristics, and important developments)
 - e. Extra-literary research
- 3. Connect the literary works with their own lives and with the social, cultural, and historical contexts of the works and their authors.

ASSIGNMENTS

Reading: Dates for the readings are clearly indicated on the schedule. Read daily if possible and complete all reading on time. You should come to class with the assignment for the day already read.

Discussion: The success of the course will be directly related to the quality of our daily discussions. Each of you must feel comfortable contributing to discussions. And each of you should bring any questions you have about the reading to our attention during the course of our discussions.

Writing: Students will complete Canvas discussion entries related to each of the four books and will complete an analytical paper related to one or more stories.

Exams: Students will complete a midterm and final exam. Each will contain both objective items and brief written portions.

Quizzes: We will have regular quizzes to reward readers who complete the reading on-time and to prepare for our class discussions. The three lowest quiz scores will be dropped. Quizzes cannot be made up for students who happen to be absent.

Canvas Discussion Groups: You will be placed in small groups for online discussions between class sessions. At times you will be given a topic for conversation. At other times you will be able to discuss any aspect of the reading you wish.

PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance at all classes is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent from more than 10 percent of class meetings, the faculty member can file a written report which may result in de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive the appropriate grade for their work and participation.
